

Keep well this winter

- Get your free flu jab even if you're fighting fit. If you care for someone aged 65 or over, or are a frontline care worker, you should think about vaccinating yourself against the flu too.
- Ask about the pneumo jab. There's a
 vaccine for pneumonia too check if you're
 eligible when you get your flu jab.
- Wash your hands regularly. Simple but effective – washing your hands helps stop germs spreading.

Flu viruses are always changing, so you need a jab every year, using the latest vaccine. Flu isn't only unpleasant, it can also develop into pneumonia, which can be serious.

The cold puts more pressure on our hearts and circulatory systems. As we get older, our body has to work harder to keep us warm. If you're exposed to a cold environment for a long time, or in extreme cold for only a short time, your blood pressure rises and your blood thickens. This can increase the risk of heart attack and stroke.

Wrap up well when you go out in the cold. Layering is the best way to keep warm in winter. Don't forget a hat, gloves, thick socks and a scarf.

Make sure your home is warm enough. The ideal room temperature you should be aiming for is about 21 degrees in your living room, and about 18 degrees in your bedroom.

Eat well! Aim for at least one hot meal every day as well as warm drinks throughout the day. Having nutritious and varied food is important for good health and wellbeing.

Keep moving. Try not to sit still for more than one hour at a time. Even if you just move your arms and legs, it'll help keep you warm.





What has science to do with Christmas?

"Science and everyday life cannot and should not be separated" Rosalind Franklin, 1940

As we approach Christmas, what scientific explanations lie behind some of the events, smells, noises and sights that we associate with the season?

The first thing one usually does (having already bought the presents, of course!) is to decorate the Christmas tree. A Christmas tree has a characteristic smell – be it a spruce or another type of pine. This is mainly due to the chemical bornyl acetate, an ester which can also be used as a food additive, as a flavouring agent and in air fresheners. The other main constituents of the odour are compounds known as pinenes - named after their pine tree source. Chemists are sometimes unimaginative in naming compounds!

Historically, Christmas trees were decorated with candles, but these are now mainly used on mantlepieces or tables and in church. These typically burn with a yellow flame. The candle wax is melted by the heat of the flame and drawn up by the wick, where it is burnt. The colour of the flame is due to soot particles; these glow yellow in the heat and then burn, but they can be seen as smoke particles when the candle is blown out. The brandy on your Christmas pudding burns with a blue flame, because it doesn't contain such soot particles.

Christmas tree lights now tend to be LEDs rather than candles or electric filament lights. Years ago all LEDs were red, because only the metal gallium was used in a semi-conductor to emit light. Different metals are now also



used, giving green and blue LEDs, which can be combined to give different colours. By combining red, green and blue LEDs in one package, a white LED was eventually created. The science of LEDs won the 2014 Nobel Prize for Physics.

Food is an important component of most people's Christmas. Traditional turkey and roast potatoes have the distinctive brown colour due to a chemical reaction - the Maillard reaction where the heat causes components of carbohydrate (reducing sugars) and of protein (amino acids) to react and give a wide variety of products. These are responsible for the specific flavours and smells of browned food.

Human genetics is also important in enjoyment of Christmas dinner. Brussels sprouts seem to be an essential part of the feast, but for many people they are unpleasant - even when not overcooked. This may in part be due to their smell but could also be due to a compound in brussels sprouts which tastes bitter to about 50% of the population who have a specific variant of the TAS2R38 gene, sometimes known as the "bitter gene". sometimes known as the "bitter gene".

What would Christmas dinner be without crackers? The 'crack' is caused by a thin layer of silver fulminate or similar explosive which is activated by friction from the rough surface on the other half of the internal cardboard strip. Party poppers work on a similar principle, and the small amount of explosive generates a sufficient volume of gas to eject the streamers.

There is a huge amount of science behind many of the presents we buy, such as the ever-popular electronic devices. However, even the wrapping paper and adhesive tape are scientifically complex. A shiny metallic wrapping paper is made by depositing metal vapour onto a plastic film. The adhesive

in common parcel tapes is designed to be pressure-sensitive, so it can be applied and relocated before pressing it down into its final position - although my personal experience is that relocating the tape is not always successful!

So physics, chemistry and biology all contribute to the delights of Christmas. Whatever your interest in science, simply enjoy its products at Christmas and every other day.

Corsley Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Neil Britten, Chairman, latest briefing

There have been no meetings in the past month. However, December brings the final quarterly meeting of the calendar year - the two main items of business being the planning application for the Corsley House bund (see more below) and the annual financial review. The latter comprises review of in-year spending, the two-year budget forecast and setting of the precept bid for the financial year (FY) 2020/21. In-year spending and the next two FYs will be very much influenced by decisions on the two major road safety projects in Corsley, at the Heath and Whitbourne Springs. The prognosis on the on the latter is pessimistic.

This edition of The Bridge is very likely to have dropped on your doorstep after the 2nd December, in which case I apologise for late notice of the main agenda items in this article, but there has been advance notice in previous Bridge briefs, on the village noticeboards, The Bridge website and in the three local pubs.

The December quarterly meeting also kicks off consideration on the Annual Parish Meeting, held annually in March each year and a notice soliciting public input is elsewhere in this edition of The Bridge.

Corsley House planning application Creation of a Landscape and Amenity Bund -(19/10108/FUL)

This application is now registered and the consultation period ends on 13th December. The plans (51 documents) are on the Wiltshire Council planning website and any member of the public may make comments via this site. To aid the process, Angus Cunningham, a senior representative of the Lutine Group, the main contractors, has very kindly agreed to be present on the 2nd December in the Reading Room from 6.30, with display boards of the planned development. He will make a brief presentation at 6.45 and then take questions. The PC will consider the application in its formal agenda for the PC meeting, which starts at 7.30. Members of the public who wish to make any points about the application will be given the opportunity to do so.

The major impacts of the project have already described in the November edition of The Bridge, with the construction phase being the major concern so far raised by residents. Informal discussions have already taken place between the PC and Lutine on this aspect, the central issues being road safety and traffic congestion both on the A362 and Deep Lane. Further clarification will be sought on the 2nd December.

Bay Tree Close Development

A brief progress report has been received from Andy Mead, Wiltshire Commissioning

Officer for the project, which reads:

"Surveys have been carried out on the land (Topographical, Utilities and Ecology), we have now engaged with numerous contractors to discuss the design and build contracts for various sites - including this location. I am to present tomorrow to several contractors, more site-specific detail, prior to procuring and formally appointing a contractor in the new year.

In the meantime, we are working with an architect to design several house types that we will develop, with a view to achieve outline planning consent by spring 2020, ready for the contractor to commence construction in the of summer 2020.

At the appropriate time, we can meet again to discuss site layout, etc, and formally consult yourselves and the community."

Campanology News

Peals, Quarters, Grandsires and Bobs – it's all in the technique!

Firstly I managed to ring my peal with five other very good ringers. We rang 5040 changes of a mixture of two methods, Bob Doubles and Grandsire Doubles which took 2 hours and 53 minutes. To explain: firstly, some ringers ring many peals and there is a register kept of the persons who get the most in their ringing lifetime. However, others like me, just have a go to see if they can ring for that length of time without going wrong, for if anyone goes wrong it has to be abandoned even if it is over two hours gone! I was extremely pleased to have achieved it but will never attempt another as it has taken me two weeks to recover from both the tiredness and the aching.

Secondly, we rang a quarter peal of Bob Doubles which involved 1260 changes and took 50 minutes. This was on 10th November after the Remembrance Service to honour and remember those who lost their lives in the World Wars. As we only had five bells last year we were unable to do this on the hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice. This also formed part of the Salisbury Guild quarter peal week. The band consisted of Liz Attenborough, Rodney Cross, Peter Baker, Mike Attenborough (Conductor), Ed Henderson and me and it was Ed's first quarter peal. Well done everyone!

Quarter peals are rung to improve ringers' ability in ringing a method. As with everything else, consistent practice can only improve one's knowledge of what to do and when to do it. Our ringing has improved since the bells came back, not only because they are easier to ring but because everyone has been working very hard and we will be attempting more quarter peals in the next year to hopefully build on that.

We will be ringing for Sunday services, Carols in the Barn and the Carol Service in the Church and of course we will be ringing the New Year in!

Seven Open Doors

Dear Friends,

I'm going to be really honest: I wish I didn't have to write this letter. We have a general election looming, and the country is in chaos. Poverty levels are rising. Across the world daily, hourly, desperate people risk their lives in an attempt to escape brutally oppressive and unjust regimes. An environmental crisis of apocalyptic proportions is being played out in bush fires across the world that are out of control, not to mention flooding, and loss of natural habitat that has devastating consequences for us all. I quote: 'Insect population decline affects ecosystems, other animal populations, and humanity. ... A 2019 global review warned that, if not mitigated by decisive action, the decline would have a catastrophic impact on the planet's ecosystems.'

And, it's Christmas. I feel I should come with something profound and equally feel wholly unqualified to do so. All I can do is offer a few thoughts and hope that someone somewhere finds them helpful.

Writing the above I'm struck by the thought that the world has always been a place of great beauty but also of great pain. If we think about the time in which that first Christmas was played out Jesus was born in a country under Roman occupation; a brutal and oppressive regime if ever there was one. Mary was an underage teenage mother probably booted out of her home for bringing appalling shame on her family, she was lucky that she was not stoned to death for her behaviour. The Holy Family were refugees: no home, no money, finding their way in the dark to that horrible, dirty stable where Jesus was born.

I few years ago I wrote an alternative version of the Christmas story in which I had Mary giving birth to Jesus on the floor of the loo in Burger King in amongst filthy bits of tissue, cigarette butts and other such inviting detritus. I remember telling the story to the year 6 class at school and their expressions of horror and disgust at such a scenario. It's so much easier to water it all down isn't it, and have Jesus born in in a nice cosy stable with fresh, sweet smelling hay and clean well behaved animals. But to do so is to miss the point entirely. In all the mess that is the reality of human existence what is the constant that we need to hold onto? It's love of course. The Christmas story is not a sweet fairy tale to bring out once a year with the decorations, it's a shocking, amazing, gutsy picture of love blazing forth in the darkest of places. Into the dirty, grimy, shameful realty of what it means to be human love is born. In our beautiful, broken, often sad old world we are all finding our way in the dark to where love still shines, often hidden yes, but not extinguished.

So, having said all that, enjoy your Christmas. Remember that love is the greatest gift God gives us and that we can give each other; treasure it, live it, and give thanks for it.



Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Phil Jefferson reports on the meetings of Chapmanslade Parish Council held on 14th November

Seven members of the public attended the meeting, which was chaired by John Lewis, our Vice-Chairman and presently acting Chairman.

Thoulstone Golf Course - self-catering holiday accommodation

The meeting began with a presentation by Adam Gough, from 'Natural Land', the company that will shortly be developing a complex of self-catering holiday accommodation on the former Thoulstone golf course site. The project will soon go out to tender and it is expected that construction of phase one will commence next April, with completion by September 2021. Local contractors and sub-contractors will be encouraged to bid for contracts.

Phase One will include 16 residential units, out of a final total of 28, as well as a farm shop, market garden, community buildings and business and work rooms. There will also be a 10-hole golf course and three residential premises for staff accommodation. There will be a network of footpaths around the site and 'cycle-friendly' access to Chapmanslade. Mr Gough has promised to return at a later date in order to provide further information on the project's progress.

Barters Farm development

Lochailort, the company developing the site

for housing at Barters Farm, have told us that they are still not ready to come to a parish council meeting. We hope that they will attend our January meeting. In the meantime we have written to Wiltshire Council to seek clarification on access routes to the site by construction traffic. Unfortunately we have not yet received a response from them. We hope that by the time we meet in January we will have received an explanation.

Thoulstone Farm 19/06916/FUL

Application to construct two single-storey extensions, internal modifications, new secondary highways access. We learned that planning permission, subject to conditions, has now been granted.

Thoulstone Farm 19/10721/FUL and 19/10403/LBC

Application to renovate, convert and extend the existing farm buildings to create nine residential dwellings. These two applications will be considered at a meeting of the parish council hopefully to be held on 5th December.

Planning Application 19/07948/FUL

Change of Use of Agricultural Building to Live/Work unit and Change of Use of the Potting Shed to Tourist Accommodation (retrospective).

We reported on this application in last month's edition of The Bridge and have now learned that Wiltshire Council has turned

down the application. We have asked Wiltshire to use their enforcement powers to remove the changes to the site introduced since the 2011 planning consent and we agreed to monitor the position.

Highways

We discussed several highways issues. Foremost of them was our concern about a recent road traffic accident in the High Street and the ever-increasing flow of traffic, creating hazardous conditions for both drivers and pedestrians. Comments were made about the parking of vehicles in the vicinity of the telephone box: the Highway Code stipulates that there should not be any parking within ten metres of a road junction. The recent painting of an "H bar" outside the newly built houses in this vicinity may, in part, be responsible for this. The parish council has tried many times over the years to come up with answers to the High Street's traffic problems and we resolved to ask the Village Voice traffic group to try to come up with workable solutions. One positive outcome of the recent concerns has been that the Speedwatch team now has two new members.

Road safety on the A36 around Black Dog Hill was also raised. We noted that a recent inquest following the death of a young woman and her unborn child had recently been held and that excessive speed on the part of another driver had been responsible for the account. Whilst accepting that there are valid concerns about road safety on this stretch of trunk road we agreed that our current efforts should be concentrated on pursuing solutions to road safety issues in the High Street.

Phone Box

BT have informed us that they intend to remove the phone box. It has only been used once in the past twelve months. This topic has arisen several times in recent years but without resolution. Some residents feel it should be retained because it is an icon of rural life.

Others feel it is in a dangerous location in an already dangerous High Street. We can appeal against the decision, accept it, or buy the box for £,1. We know that there are divided views on this matter in the community so we decided to set up a consultation exercise in order to ascertain current views. Watch out for further information on the village website and Facebook pages.

Bee Friendly Chapmanslade

It was reported that the Bee Friendly Group (BFG) has agreed with Wiltshire Council a number of proposed priority areas in the parish for wildflower seeding. We agreed to support the venture, which will be managed by the BFG.

A History of Chapmanslade

We learned that the book, which was launched last month after six years of research and discussion, has already sold around 250 copies. This means that shortly the production costs will have been met, after which all future proceeds will pass to village funds. The parish council has written to the History Group congratulating them on their efforts.

Next meetings

We normally meet in the Village Hall on the second Thursday of the month. However, because of the General Election it is hoped that the December meeting will be held in the church at 7.30 pm on Thursday 5th December. Our January meeting will be held on Thursday 9th January.

The future of the...

Len White Charity

The Trustees of the Len White Charity, Corsley Parish Councillors, give public notice that consideration is being given to winding up this charity in accordance with its Trust Deed

The Trustees seek final bids for grants by 31 December 2019 and feedback on their intentions for the residual capital of the Fund.

Purpose of the charity

The t Charity was set up in 1991 by Corsley Parish Council in memory of Len White, a well known and respected resident of the Village. The parish councillors are the trustees and the objects of the charity are:

- " (a) To pay the income from the charity fund for the benefit of the pupils of Corsley School, in such manner as the Corsley Parish Council think fit or
- (b) If Corsley Primary School closes then for the benefit of the children living in Corsley between the ages of five and eleven years for educational purposes as the full Corsley Parish Council shall think fit."

Financial position

The funds of the Charity are now such that no meaningful income is achievable on the remaining capital and the residue of the accrued income is now at such a low level that only one or two low value grants could be considered. After any final grants, there would be around f, 1,000 capital remaining.

Terms of the Trust

The trust deed, in the event of 'failure of the trust', allows the assets of the trust to be given to "...such other charitable institution or institutions having similar objectives to those

of the charity as the trustees shall decide." The trustees believe that exhaustion of the funds available for distribution is tantamount to 'failure' and that options for distribution of the remaining capital should be considered.

Options

The Trustees have been unable to identify any 'institutions having similar objectives' with the restrictive direct requirement to serve only the children of Corsley. Instead, consideration has been given to using the remaining capital to assist the funding of a project in Corsley which would serve the needs of children and also provide a lasting memorial to Len White and those who donated to the Fund in 1991. To date, the project which has met with most favour is replacement of the Heath bus stop shelter, which is in poor repair. This would provide long term benefit to Corsley children who use the public bus service and a suitable location for a memorial plaque.

Consultation

The Trustees have consulted the Charity Commission and Len White's family. The Charity Commission are content for the trustees to make their judgement in accordance with the deed provided that they have taken appropriate steps to ensure that suitable advertising has identified no further beneficaries. The family (Mrs Ruth Bowers) have concurred with the proposal to use the

remaining capital as indicated above. This notice is intended to fulfill the requirement for 'suitable advertising'.

Way forward

Comments are invited on the above proposals and any bids for grants in accordance with the Charity Deeds, by 31st December this year. A further notice will be placed in the December edition of The Bridge.



Ask a pharmacist for advice before minor ailments or winter illnesses get


Community pharmacists are qualified healthcare professional who can offer clinical advice and over the counter medicines to safely manage things like coughs, colds and sore throats.
