A funeral service was conducted by Canon Tony Watts, for Michael Taylor at Saint George's church in Beckington on Wednesday 19th January. The church was filled with people, the organ played gently, the flowers were beautiful and there was an atmosphere of real love and respect for a man that we all held very dear. Donations in Michael's memory were to be offered to Warminster Food Bank and Sreepur Village (Bangladesh).

Michael and Sue moved to Corsley in 1996. Michael immediately immersed himself in the life of the village whilst also working as a volunteer advisor at the Citizens Advice Bureau in Warminster and, when that closed, Midsomer Norton. He became a trustee of St Mary's church at Temple where he skilfully restored the lychgate with his carpentry skills. He became Chairman of the Horticultural and Craft Committee for Corsley Show, which went from strength to strength under his guidance. After some ten years in this position, he handed over many of the jobs he was doing but stayed on as 'Quartermaster' keeping everyone together and ensuring things were run to the highest of standards. His ability to problem-solve, and the kindness and enthusiasm he threw into everything he did was pivotal to the success of the show tent. His sweet peas and vegetables were winners and his marmalade was legendary! His son Alan could always be called upon to lend a hand on show day and Sue was always beside

Michael with her support and love, as well as a healthy competitive element which amused us all. They were both appreciated by so many people, not just in Corsley, but beyond.

They moved to Beckington in 2017, quickly becoming a part of the community whilst retaining their strong links with Corsley. Michael always had something interesting to talk about, loved to cook for friends and family and we never heard him say an unkind word. He was supportive and encouraging to everyone.

Our thoughts are with Sue and all the family. Michael will be sorely missed by so many people whose lives he touched – we have lost a wonderful friend.

Changes to refuse collections

From 28th February 2022, the non-recyclable waste (black bin) collection days will change for 94% of Wiltshire residents. Recycling and garden waste collections are not affected. The council's waste collection contractors. Hills Municipal Collections Ltd (Hills), will be implementing new collection rounds.

Why are these changes to refuse collection days required?

- · The redesigned rounds will be more efficient and result in significant financial savings to the council over the remaining term of waste collection contract and help reduce carbon emissions through the more efficient deployment of vehicle resources. Fewer collection vehicles will be needed.
- · The total savings achieved from the reduction in vehicle fleet and associated operational costs are estimated to be around £0.4m each year over the remaining four full years of the contract.
- Under the contract, Hills is also required to ensure that the council is able to fulfil its annual tonnage target commitments for its Landfill Diversion Contracts, including the direct delivery of residual waste to the Mechanical Biological Treatment (MBT) facility in Northacre, Westbury.
- · The current rounds were not modelled to provide for the full direct delivery of residual waste to the Northacre MBT. The redesigned rounds will help avoid waste transfer costs of approximately £,0.09m per year.
- · Tonnages of non-recyclable waste collected at the kerbside increased substantially during the pandemic, with more people working from home or isolating for periods of time. While kerbside-collected tonnages have now begun to subside, the tonnages still remain higher than pre-COVID-19 levels.
- · Several years of house building and changes

- in depot locations mean that the current collection rounds are now unbalanced and inefficient. The new rounds will even out the daily workloads, while also providing sufficient capacity for future projected housebuilding up to the end of the current contract term.
- In early February, all Wiltshire households will receive an information letter effectively providing notice consistent with a full 10day collection cycle of the current service, before the change is implemented from 28th February. In addition, bin hanger information tags will be fixed to the handles of waste containers on the last collection under the outgoing schedule, reminding residents of the impending change to collection days.
- Given the scale of the changes involved, some service disruption is expected during the first six weeks of implementation while the collection crews and residents familiarise themselves with the redesigned rounds and new collection dates. Reports of missed collections are expected to increase over this period, but numbers should return to normal levels after three complete collection cycles. The council and Hills are working together on contingency planning to recover any temporary reduction in service performance over the six-week implementation period.
- Currently 14,200 (7%) Wiltshire households have their residual waste and recycling collected on the same day in the same week. Under the remodelled rounds, this will increase to 23,400 (11%) households. While we are aware that some people find this arrangement convenient, it may be a concern for others. The council and Hills will proactively respond to any issues and will seek alternative arrangements where possible.



I am writing from Age UK Wiltshire to let you know about the local Wiltshire Surviving Winter Grant (SWG), for which we are one of the partner organisations supporting older people to apply for the grant.

The scheme is aimed at older people at risk of fuel poverty and aims to support them by providing a one-off £200 grant alongside holistic advice to help ensure they are maximising their income and receiving support for any other issues they may have.

It has been running on an annual basis for a number of years and is organised and fundraised through Wiltshire Community Foundation. It is likely to remain open until around March 2022 (but may close sooner if all grants are distributed).

The Parish Council (PC) met for its first meeting of 2022 in the Reading Rooms on 10th January. The meeting was attended by our County Councillor, Bill Parks.

Baytree Close Development

The meeting was joined remotely by Christine Brown, the Residential Development Project Manager for the further development of the Baytree site. She explained that the original planning application had been withdrawn following consultation and that it was hoped a fresh application would be submitted by the end of the month. The meeting was shown a revised plan for the site that showed that the dwellings planned had been more sympathetically placed within the site and a number of issues that the PC had commented on previously were being addressed e.g. hedging along the A362. The issue of drainage is still to be finalised, both foul water and rainfall runoff but the planners are well aware of this and will want to see a viable solution to this before they will approve it. The PC reiterated their desire that those with local connections are prioritised in the lettings and sale processes.

It is important that those who think they will be are interested in either renting or the shared ownership properties (3 x two beds) should register with Homes4Wiltshire who are Wiltshire Councils agents in this area. Help is available to 'navigate 'through this if applicants are in difficulty.

Co-option

Following the advertising of the vacancy on the PC, four applications for co-option had been received. The PC were pleased to invite John Phillips of Knapps Gate to join the council.

Planning Applications

A retrospective planning application had been received:

PL/2021/10981. Retention of conversion of former milking parlour to holiday let and rebuilding of outbuilding for entertainment room ancillary use to The Malthouse, At Malthouse, Court

The Parish Council commented that it does not condone development being undertaken that clearly requires Planning permission (and potentially Listed Building consent) and retrospective applications subsequently being submitted.

In considering the planning application on its merits, the Parish Council raised no objection subject to:

The holiday let being conditioned in an appropriate manner and, in accordance with Wiltshire's preferred wording, so that it can only be used as a holiday let.

That an additional condition is placed on the holiday let so that the building remains in the ownership of The Malthouse and ownership cannot be severed and the building sold as a separate entity (as has been placed on other similar developments in Corsley).

That the entertainment room is conditioned to be used for purposes incidental to The Malthouse main house and cannot be hired on a commercial basis.

That the planning officer confirms that Listed Building Consent is not also required for the development that has been undertaken.

The PC had become aware, via the applicant, that a planning application had been submitted by Wessex Solar Energy for the installation of solar panels at Lodge Hill, Berkley. It was disappointing that the PC had not been included as consultees by Mendip DC given the proximity of the development to the parish boundary and the fact that it would be seen from parts of the parish. It was noted that a number of the comments on the website relating to the development were from Corsley residents.

Streetscene

David Ball, the PC rep for streetscene reported that the meeting of our MP with officers and members of Wiltshire Council, and representatives of Chapmanslade and Maiden Bradley parish councils and the Maiden Bradley Weight Watchers Group to discuss the concerns about HGV traffic through the villages had been cancelled due to COVID-19. To date, a new meeting date has not been agreed.

The discussions with Wiltshire Council regarding the speed limit review through the village are ongoing.

It was agreed that the estimates for Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs), village gates and additional road safety signage that had been provided should be incorporated into the budget discussions.

Footpaths

Alice Helliar, the PC rep for footpaths had circulated a comprehensive report on the state of footpaths in the village and the state of the kissing gates, signs and stiles. The report included indicative costings for the replacement of gates and stiles and the options that the PC could adopt. The report highlighted the differences in costings of wooden versus metal replacements and the significant difference in the lifespan and maintenance of these. It was agreed that a sum would be set aside for the ongoing maintenance/renewal of the gates/stiles.

Finance

The PC reviewed the spending to date in the current financial year and considered the likely expenditure for the remainder of the year, including the number of projects that had been identified and the impact this would have on setting a budget for the following year. It was agreed that, subject to Wiltshire Councils agreement on siting, that the installation of SIDs should be progressed in this year. The other significant project to be funded in this financial year is the rebuilding of the bus stop at the Heath. Provision is also made in this year for the grants/donations that the PC makes to village organisations. (See separate notification in this edition of The Bridge for details of how to apply and the timescales.)

It was agreed that the precept for 2022/2023 should include provision for the village gates and the start of a programme of maintenance/renewal of the kissing gates/ styles/field gate around the parish. It was agreed that to cover the ongoing expenditure, the planned 'improvements' to road safety and the environment and a one-off amount to assist in the funding of village based celebrations in aid of the Queens Platinum Jubilee, the precept should be set at £14,500.

Annual Parish Meeting (APM)

Legally the APM should take place between 1st March and 1st June. Last year the impact of COVID-19 meant that the APM did not take place until September. On the assumption that there will be no further restrictions, it is proposed that the APM will be held on the 7 March. Villagers will know that it has been the practice in the past to invite guest speakers to this meeting. Suggestions are sought as to whom should be invited this year.

Six Open Doors

Dear Friends,

I write on a perishing cold grey old day. It's that time of year isn't it, when it can feel unbearably cold and miserable and spring seems a long way off, especially this year when most of are feeling somewhat weary and worn down and hope is sometimes hard to sustain. But, (I suspect that I write about this every February - but never mind, I do it because it's so special) those miraculous, achingly beautiful little plants, the snowdrops, are beginning to brave the cold and push their delicate stems through the cold earth into the light. How gloriously clever of nature to give us something so exquisite just when we are wondering how we are going to get through final months of winter.

In his poem Firelight and Nightfall D. H. Lawrence writes 'Here lamps are white like snowdrops in the grass.' Yes! They are like lamps aren't they, lighting up these dull days and calling us to pay attention to the beauty of the natural world, to what another poet George Herbert described as 'heaven in ordinary', pointing us toward hope.

Herbert's poems are prayers really and most people at some stage or another in their lives find prayer difficult; they cannot find the right words, or they feel that God has deserted them, that prayer is a waste of time. Weirdly, it's often when we admit to feeling the absence of God that we are actually closest to him because we've let go of our limited understanding of what that closeness looks like. In the Christian tradition there are some wonderful examples of writing in this vein, the most famous I suppose being John of the Cross, a Spanish mystic who talked of 'dazzling darkness' and the paradox of finding God where it would seem he is not.

Anyway, what is prayer? I think we define it too narrowly. We are moved by those snowdrops, we respond to that beauty, we are lifted out of our own preoccupations; is that not prayer? I've never forgotten what someone said to me, many years ago now. With four small children all under 6, I found it difficult to pray and I felt really guilty about it. Instead of telling me to go and hide myself in the airing cupboard or something this wise priest said, 'Your children are your prayer, God has given them to you, at this point in time, this is where you are, and it's ok'

So, I don't know where you find yourself at this point in time, but I'm going to leave you with another poem, Prayer, this time by the brilliant Carol Anne Duffy, and do go and find those snowdrops.

Some days, although we cannot pray, a prayer utters itself. So, a woman will lift her head from the sieve of her hands and stare at the minims sung by a tree, a sudden gift.

Some nights, although we are faithless, the truth enters our hearts, that small familiar pain. then a man will stand stock-still, hearing his youth in the distant Latin chanting of a train.

Pray for us now. Grade 1 piano scales console the lodger looking out across a Midlands town. Then dusk, and someone calls a child's name as though they named their loss.

Darkness outside. Inside, the radio's prayer - Rockall. Malin. Dogger. Finisterre.



Removal of hedges on agricultural land

Keith Collins questions the removal of valuable hedges

I was very interested to read Judith Helliar's comments, in January's "Countryside Matters", on reasons for maintaining hedges in gardens and on agricultural land. She quite rightly referred to their importance to all kinds of wildlife, and the removal of hedges, whether farm or garden, means the loss of natural habitat for so many creatures. Organisations including CPRE, Wildlife Trusts, National Trust, Countryside Alliance, Woodland Trust, etc., all regard hedges as being vitally important to the wellbeing of nature and the environment.

My wife and I have lived in Chapmanslade for nearly 35 years and have been saddened to see the huge decline in the numbers and species of birds, butterflies and other insects, over that time. It is caused by a number of factors, but one of the most important is loss of habitat. If we do not preserve, maintain, and enhance natural habitat now, it will be lost for ever. Chapmanslade is a "bee friendly" village, the new housing in the village is called "Honey Glade", but for how much longer will there be bees?

So, in mid-December, whilst walking along Mill Lane, towards Corsley Mill, I was shocked to see that approximately 200m of mature, overgrown but healthy hedgerow had been cut down to ground level. This was a boundary hedge to a field on the north west side of the lane and, judging by the variety

of species of trees and shrubs growing in it, could be regarded as an ancient hedgerow.

If the hedge needed to be maintained, surely it would have been much better to top and thin it and carry out some small-scale cutting back. It would then still have been a sanctuary for wild life - birds, mammals and insects. As it stands now, if this is regarded as coppicing and it is allowed to regenerate, how long will it take to be of any benefit to nature? 10 years, 15 years or more? We do not have that time! I assume the arisings from the hedge removal will be burnt, and this will produce a huge amount of CO, and other toxic emissions.

I would be very interested and grateful if anyone can give me, and other concerned villagers, good reasons why this hedge had to be removed.

Memories of Corsley School

All the world's a stage

David Ball recalls his tenure as Headteacher at Corsley School...

Corsley School in the late 80's had three classrooms. One was a mobile classroom which stood alone on the playground with teacher Boo Hardy and her Classroom Assistant June Snelgrove plus the Reception and Year One Infants.



PE was generally a warm weather activity at Corsley School, as it had to take place outside. I did run a Gym Club for the junior children, but this involved a car journey after school in parents cars to New Close School in Warminster, where we could make use of their large hall and especially their PE apparatus (Wall Bars, Climbing Frames and Ropes) and small equipment and mats.

In the main school building there were another two classrooms the smaller of which held the Year Two Infants and Year Three juniors with their teacher Marg Leach. The largest classroom at the front of the building was the Headteachers Class which held all the Year Four, Five and Six Junior children linked to the Old School House it was the first room visitors would enter and closest to the telephone if the Head was needed. This classroom also doubled as the School

Hall and at the end of each day, in a well practiced routine, the junior children moved all the tables and chairs to one side and all three classes came together for a whole school assembly. It was a very large rectangular room with a small cubby hole off the far corner which served as Mave Stockting, the school secretary's, office and at the other end a very large, solidly built wooden stage which was used for Christmas Nativity plays, occasional

special assemblies and special events eg. Visiting theatre groups, performances by the children, etc. It took up nearly a third of the space and was the very first thing visitors to the school saw when they entered the building.

At that time

One day Jenny Lewin (the Chair of Governors) and I were in the large classroom, discussing the best use of the space in the school (as the numbers on roll were growing) and we decided that if the stage was removed - which stood unused for most of the time - there would be a lot of space released, all the staff agreed and thought it was a great idea. Fired with enthusiasm the stage was demolished the following weekend. It was extremely well made and took several hours to demolish, but the extra space it released was

well worth the effort we thought.

The following Monday afternoon, after school, I had a visitor, Keith Snelgrove. Keith was a parent at the school, Vice-Chair of Governors and a member of the PTA. "I've come to have a look at your classroom now the stage has gone" he said. I took him in and showed him all the extra space, enthused about how we would be able to fix a climbing frame and ropes on the wall, open a doorway into the Old School House, use a portable new stage stored in the outbuildings for special events and have much more space for whole school daily assemblies and special events, etc. Keith did not seem quite as enthusiastic. "Who took down the old stage?" he asked. "I did" I said, "I don't know who built it, but it was very solid and well built, a real craftsman's work - took me hours to take it all apart". "I'm glad to hear you say that," said Keith, "I'm the one who built it!"



Walking through lockdown

A muddy town walk



Although this is a 2-3 mile town walk, wellies are a good idea, as mud is likely in many places. Your starting point is Warminster Civic Centre, in the car park off Sambourne Road. Walk alongside the building and pass the side of the Factory Shop, to the High Street. Use the crossing there and climb the steps through 'The Close' archway and keep walking ahead. You'll pass 'The Old Fire Station' on your left and emerge eventually onto Portway. Across to your left should be Portway House, while the War Memorial should be at your right. Cross this busy road and walk alongside the Portway House railings.

This is now private apartments, but it was built for a clothier in 1722 and was the town's library when I moved to Corsley in 1979. There's a brick 'gazebo' on the corner wall here, but it and the red-brick building next door are derelict. You'll come to a turning left into Portway Lane next; use that and cross the road to the pavement opposite, walking left.

The buildings along the right side of this road

aren't exciting, but residents do have green space opposite to enjoy. Walk the pavement until the blocks of flats run out and you'll see the grass opposite has run out, too. Cross the junction on to Glovers Lane, a footpath, and walk beside the lake fencing there. Stay on the footpath, with its markings for bikers and walkers, and you'll arrive at Furnax Lane Industrial Estate, passing a compound of stone blocks on your right, while ahead of you are signs for the Travis Perkins compound.

As you near that, you'll see a sign for the

Howdens compound ahead and left – go that way. When you reach the road sign 'Newopaul Way' at your left, cross the road and keep to the left side of the new one. You'll pass Screwfix on the right and reach another iunction.

Ahead of you now should be the Council Recycling Facility (exciting, eh?!). Go left here and eventually pass Dent's Factory Shop frontage and car park; the main Bath Road should be visible ahead; go that way.

Walking past industrial buildings may not seem enjoyable, but these are roads you'd probably never see on foot!

Turn left onto Bath Road and there are red-brick terraced homes on your left, with cream bungalows after and a cream-coloured house on the right, ahead. When you're very near the house, cross this busy road very carefully and you'll see a carwidth public footpath runs past the house and garden. Use that, passing a private gateway to a rugby pitch, on your right. When you reach a second (unmarked) rugby pitch gate, walk the muddy narrow lane going left nearby and go into the field, using the grass trail going ahead. Away left now should be Warminster School playing fields, while the trail takes you to a stone bridge across a stream. This will be very muddy if we've had lots of rain; I've left





wellies behind when stepping across the mud at the end of this bridge!

Climb the slope away from the bridge and you're in an open area, with a muddy track going right or left. Ahead of you is a bush and tree-filled swamp – there's no other word for it, if we've had lots of rain! If you feel like exploring, go right here and wander through different fields, but beware; this area's true marshland!

Otherwise, turn left onto the muddy track after the

bridge and follow it round the swamp to reach houses and roads; there should be a big puddly parking area to your right. Turn

> left here onto the pavement of Grovelands Way and climb to the mini-roundabout, with Wakefield's vehicle repair facility across the road. Go left again and descend Vicarage Street, passing Wren House on the left (built for another clothier circa 1720) and Warminster School buildings on both side of the road. Cross the road at the lights outside The Courtyard Nursery, to Warminster Prep School and walk into Emwell Street left. passing The Minster School and the Weymouth Arms on your right. When you emerge onto Sambourne Road, use the zebra crossing and take the side road to your left, into the main car park. If you need facilities and sustenance, walk a few more yards into town and take your pick of places!



A view from over the hedge...

Countryside Matters

After the mildest recorded temperature for New Year, January has been blessed with high pressure bringing frosty or grey misty days

I must thank my local rainfall recorders for their recordings of rainfall for 2021.

33.89 inches Lane End, Corsley

(44.60 inches in 2020)

Friggle Steet, Frome

30 inches

Both recorders noted that July and October were our wettest months with over 4 inches of rain in each of those months.

Already our days are a longer by a few minutes every day, but records will tell us that February, although the shortest month in days, can be our real month for proper winter weather.

February fill dyke

Regardless of rain or snow, the ditches will usually fill in February. We usually think of dykes in low lying moorland or reclaimed land from the sea. Ditches usually border properties or land; along hedges where there are two ownerships, the hedge is the responsibility of the owner the ditch is maintained by the neighbour.

Ditch clearing, hedge trimming and hedge laying are often carried out by contractors who are employed to do spring and harvest work the rest of the year, giving employment to tractors drivers on a regular basis all through the year, maintaining well-drained land and hedgerows.

At this time of year, the footpaths and bridlepaths can become heavily trodden and muddy from regular use by walkers, cyclists horses, tractors or cattle; for your own pleasure and safety, do use maintained paths and lanes where possible, ensuring you are visible by other road users. Walkers wearing dark-coloured clothing on dark mornings and evenings are an accident waiting to happen and it is often the dog or horse that comes off worst.

Our birdlife is suffering greatly with avian influenza (bird flu), especially swans and geese, causing the culling of thousands of poultry birds kept outside and indoors.

It is carried by migrating birds and accelerated by the mild temperatures we are experiencing at the moment. At present it is a virus rarely transferred to humans, but the scientists are keeping a keen eye on this.

Looking on the brighter side of country living, I saw my first lamb this week and the first of the snowdrops are showing through. The lovely sunrises and sunsets on brighter days have been breathtaking!

Keep safe and well and enjoy the countryside when you can.


