Nobody expected it to reach production, let alone become one of the most successful aircraft of its time, serving in many roles and in all theatres of war. Household batteries can now be collected as part of Wiltshire kerbside recycling service

We are pleased to confirm that we are now able to collect some types of small batteries as part of our kerbside recycling service.

Put your small household batteries in clear, sealed sandwich bags on top of your blue lidded bin and they will be collected for recycling. Please do not put batteries out for collection earlier than this date.

The batteries you can put out for collection are 'D', 'C', 'AA', 'AAA', 9V and button-type batteries. They will be kept separate from other recyclable materials on board the collection vehicles.

Planning permission for new development in Corsley

After some revisions, many of which resulted from feedback from local residents, the development next to Baytree Close has now been given the go ahead. Work on the site, which is being delivered by Wiltshire Council's Residential Development Team, will begin in 2023.

The development will provide eight new affordable homes for Corsley,



advised on minimising disturbance to wildlife. The relevant part of the hedge will therefore be trimmed down to 1 metre before the bird nesting season and the rest of the hedge taken out after any hibernating animals have departed. You will therefore see this first hedge cut early in 2023 at the position indicated by the yellow line on the plan.

two adapted bungalows, one three bed and five two bed houses. Three of the two bed houses will be for shared ownership and the rest will be available for social rent. In both cases, priority will be given to local people. If you are interested in the social rent properties, please ensure you have applied for Homes4Wiltshire's housing need register. How to contact us - Wiltshire (homes4wiltshire. co.uk). The shared ownership properties will be advertised locally during the construction phase.

Note from Neil Carpenter, Chair, Corsley Parish Council:

From my last conversation with Christine the shared ownership homes will be at full market value for Corsley. I was expecting the house value to be a reduction from market rate with claw back if/when the home is sold.

Being shared ownership will mean that the purchaser will need to have a mortgage and be paying rent on top. I have not seen any information about whether rent will be affordable or market rate.

Parish Council Briefing

Councillor Phil Holihead, rounds up the PC's activity in December 2022

The Parish Council met on Thursday 8th December 2022. The main points discussed were:

Dog Bins

The bin at the end of Wood Lane has now been moved making it more accessible and moving away from local residences. Thanks are due to the team of volunteers who did the work.

HGV meeting

As reported by both BBC and ITV local news the latest in a number of meetings to lower HGV weight limits in Chapmanslade, Corsley, and Maiden Bradley took place on Friday 2nd December 2022. Our MP, Dr Murrison, chaired the meeting, but Wiltshire Council Highways declined the offer to attend. The outcome is a letter from our MP to the Leader of Wiltshire Council requesting a meeting to unblock the lack of action by the Highways Department and to investigate the creation of an experimental traffic order to lower the weight limits for a trial period to measure the effect.

Queen's Canopy tree planting

A group of villagers turned out to plant just over 60 saplings around the playground and along the path at the Village Hall. The trees were ordered by the PC as part of the Queen's Canopy project. There are still some trees available for planting at a later date.

A 'ceremonial' oak sapling grown from an acorn picked in Chapmanslade was planted by the youngest (and oldest!) attendees and a plaque was erected to mark the event.

Thanks are due to Adam Oakley for making the arrangements, the History Group for funding the plaque, and to everyone who turned out to support this project which will be good for our environment and provide shelter for the playground. The tea and cakes afterwards were a welcome relief from the cold.

Planning

PL/2022/08650: Woodland Retreat for dogs. Turnpike Cottage. There were no objections to this application.

PL/2022/08195: Construction of oak framed garage 45 High St. There were no objections to this application.

PL/2022/09101: Replacement of existing curtilage outbuilding to provide residential ancillary use, Corsley Mill. The PC objected to this application on the grounds that it was within the curtilage of a listed building and thus required listing building planning permission; the new building was much larger and could be considered a new build not intended for agricultural use and outside the development boundary. There were also concerns about preserving and managing the existing footpath during and post construction and the proximity of existing large trees to the position of the proposed building.

Finance

The PC agreed to increase the sum allocated

to the Village Hall Committee from the $\pounds 1,500$ already allocated to $\pounds 2,000$ to be used to refurbish the cricket pavilion.

The precept was agreed at 2.98% increase, very slightly below the 3-5% proposed by Wiltshire Council.

Next meeting





Wonderful Walks

On the crest of a New Year!

Kerninser Union Workhouse

Let's have a local walk this time, not too far from Corsley and Chapmanslade. Head into Warminster on the A362, cross the Clev Hill Roundabout and drive ahead until you see Masefield Road, the right turn off a mini-roundabout. Go that way, until you see the shops by a roundabout at your right. Park along Broxburn Road, past the Tesco store, and walk away from the shop. This isn't a pretty walk, but it's interesting! When Broxburn Road becomes Thornhill Road. climb the hill and look back at the view of Warminster roofs and hills, before turning into St. Andrew's Road. At the next junction, enter the new Redrow estate of Tascroft Rise on your left and reach a T junction, where bypass traffic can be clearly heard to your left. Turn right, descending through this massive housing site.

You're now on Osprey Road, but when a sign reads 'Eagle Road', there's a small and neat unfinished play area at your right, but go left, into Falcon Road, a cul de sac, with homes on the left and an open grass area at the right. Walk till you find the gravel path on the right, through this grassy 'Tascroft Trail', making a change from buildings. I walked it after a lot of rain and the area included a small 'lake', draining rainwater away from the homes. When the gravel path meets a road again, there's a muddy track left, which you can explore without me! From the road edge I was on, the earlier play area is off right, but go left and you'll see a sign for St. Andrews Road again, from Eagle Road. Join St. Andrew's Road, following it round the right-hand bend and down the hill, to the roundabout where Tesco is. Don't return to your car!

Cross the road you're on and walk to the next turning left, Pound Street, where an animal pound must once have been; stray animals were kept here until claimed and redeemed by owners. Walk up Pound Street until you find a wide street on your right. I couldn't find a name plate, but

along on the left nearby is West Parade Premium Store. Walk all of West Parade, until you reach Sambourne Road. To your right nearby will be Sambourne School and a right turn into The Beeches, signed as a 'No Through Road', but actually a circular road coming back to this point. There's

an interesting bit of Warminster history here, because The Beeches takes you round Warminster Union Workhouse and its impressive façade, though this place must once have struck horror into the hearts of people passing it. Built in 1837, the Workhouse

high on a red-brick wall: 'Alcock Crest 61-78'. Beyond that is a tarmacked public footpath left; take it, going downhill to Fore Street, where a crab apple tree was shedding fruit in November! Cross busy Fore Street into King Street opposite and climb uphill to South Street. Turn left and, beyond the hedges, is a wideopen space. If it's a nice day, explore the fields here, though I turned right straight away, onto

a mud and grass track crossing the open area, with housing at the right, until the field joined a stony track downhill. Go right and head back to South Street. Turn left and follow the road, past Martin Crest (your third one!) and bending right downhill, till you see the roundabout and Tesco Express away to your left. There aren't facilities and food here, but Corsley and Chapmanslade pubs will be glad to see you!



later became a 'Poor Assistance Institute', with separate accommodation for 'vagrants'. In 1948 it became Sambourne Hospital, complete with its own mortuary. It closed in 1989. Go round the 'island', turn back into The Beeches and stand outside Sambourne School.

Go left, along the front of the school and into the pot-holed lane, which is Christchurch Terrace, with a smart mini-row of red-brick buildings at your right. Walk on and you'll

reach modern housing. Turn left on the pavement and follow the road along and right; this is probably Daniell Crest; stay on the straight pavement until it bends right. You'll pass a tarmac path left, leading down to Fore Street, but follow the pavement round right, passing a terrace of red-brick housing beyond the grass and hedge at your left, until the road reaches a T-junction with Alcock Crest.

Turn left again and stay with the pavement, passing another path left, until you see a sign

Happy New Year to you all!

Maybe I ought just to mention that our December weather was exceptional! The grass was still growing in early December, so sheep had to be brought in to graze the barley crop re-growing after so much of the seed was lost before harvesting.

Then a week of the coldest weather ever recorded in December, with early morning temperatures of -7°C recorded by our early morning milking staff.

Although the snow was fairly local it certainly brought its problems for the normal business of milk being collected from the farms, deliveries of fuel and essential feedstuffs stored in other areas on the farm.

Warm milk for young calves had to be taken to them before it froze in the container and water tanks defrosted so that running water is available for all livestock, whether in the barns or out in the fields.

Sadly, Wiltshire Council had not provided enough salted grit to the villages and it was thanks to a few kind individuals that access from the A362 to the nursery school and church was possible.

Just as the temperature started to improve, the wind and rain came, rather spoiling the joy of Christmas celebrations but, in the truly British manner, we all battled on.

I hope with January 1st we can all look forward to a new year with lots of new beginnings.

If the weather is cold and crisp take the opportunity to get out early in the day if possible to make the most of our extending daylight hours.

For those who are able to enjoy the bird life in their garden, why not join in with

the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch on the weekend of Friday 27th to Sunday 29th January recording for just one hour the types of birds visiting your garden. You'll need to sign up online (rspb. org.uk) to take part (you can also get a free guide there too). You might be surprised for as well as the usual blackbirds robins and tits, there might be a few visitors you may need to check in your bird book or online. Be

prepared with a good view of the garden – the hedges, shrubs, the ground area and the bird table, get a hot drink and either a reference book or the internet and enjoy the garden from indoors.
