As part of Corsley's Diamond Jubilee celebrations, an open day was held at Corsley Reading Room on Tuesday 7th June. A steady stream of visitors from far and near was welcomed to an exhibition of memorabilia from the 1950s and 60s. Corsley Women's Institute set up a kitchen display with items from that era, many of which are still in use, and Corsley residents provided photographs, household gadgets, books, toys and other miscellaneous items to provide an impressive display. At various times during the day groups gathered around parts of the display sharing memories and talking about those early years of the Queen's reign at Corsley,

while others sat down to enjoy some splendid refreshments

provided by the Reading Room Committee. A raffle was held and £210 was raised for Diabetes UK.

The present Corsley Reading Room building has served the village since 1892 and, like many other village halls, its fortunes have ebbed and flowed. 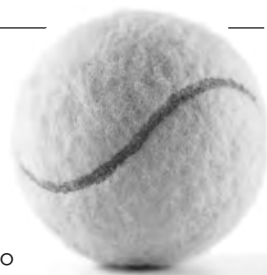
Runners-up after a play-off were Sonia Glenn and Jenny Bishop who performed consistently throughout.

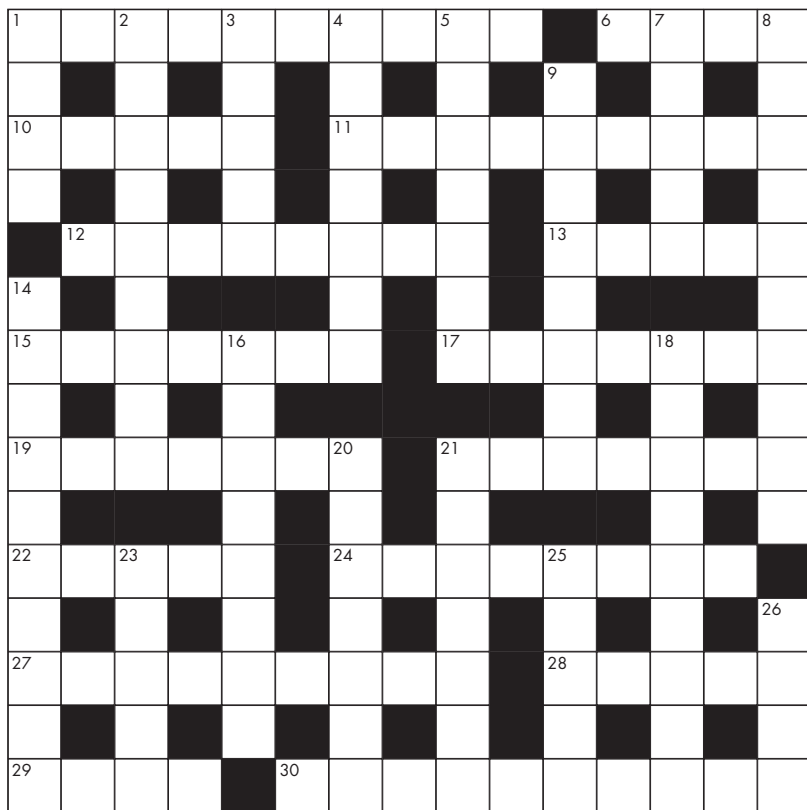

Science Teacher training in Juba

Following a very successful 'Workshop' last year to train science teachers in South Sudan a Team is going out to Juba again, from 20 July to 9 August 2012 . A Memorandum of Understanding has been signed between the South Sudan Ministry of

School. (This Lab was designed after advice from the Head of Science at Frome College and was opened in November 2011 by the Bishop of Salisbury.) The Resource Centre will enable apparatus to be constructed locally.

Education, Juba School and the Institute of Physics in London. The Institute is providing £7,000, a little under half the cost of the project. I am grateful to Andrew Campbell of Chapmanslade for his invaluable help with putting together the legal side of this Memorandum.

During the first week of their visit the Team will train technicians and help to set up a Resource Centre in the Science Lab at Juba

There is a Charity called LabAid, based in Amersham, which collects redundant apparatus from Schools and Colleges, equipment that would otherwise go into a skip, and recycles it to make it available for schools in the developing world. We have acquired from LabAid seven boxes of equipment, containing microscopes, dissecting kits, test tubes, beakers, etc., which I delivered to a packing warehouse near Heathrow Airport on 11 June. Some

quantities of Hydrochloric Acid, Ammonia and Magnesium tape have been bought. In addition, a range of tools to facilitate work in the Resource Centre has been sent out, including a pillar drill and table saw. One of the teachers in the Team lives in Suffolk and these tools were surplus at a nearby RAF base.

The equipment, weighing altogether just under half a ton, has been sent out by air freight using a firm called Avient. One of its Managers has a daughter who belongs to the Brownie pack which meets at St. Francis' Church, Salisbury. One evening he was waiting for his little girl and happened to see the notices in the church about Sudan and Juba School. He wanted to know more and so we got connected. We have received a favourable price for the air freight. 'God moves in a mysterious way his wonders to perform'.

Most science teachers in South Sudan have never done any practical work during their own education and so during the second week of the Team's visit, 30 teachers from 15 secondary schools across South Sudan, will be coming to Juba School. This group will include four outstanding teachers who were trained last year – men with the potential to train their colleagues in the use of apparatus. Each day the Team will teach some secondary classes at Juba School and so model to the Sudanese teachers how practical work can engage students and aid their understanding of concepts.

This training in South Sudan is, perhaps, a drop in the ocean, but we believe it is a very necessary first drop, as it can affect the thinking and aspirations both of the South Sudan Ministry of Education and the teachers and students who are trained.

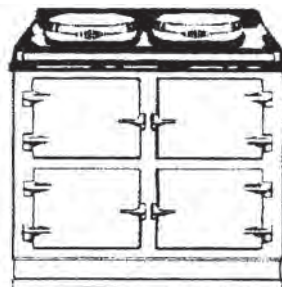

Countryside Matters

The rain just seems to have continued, albeit with some gaps in late May and early June. However, as I write this in mid-June the forecast is still unsettled. This is causing difficulties for farming and wildlife alike; so Judith as has asked me to write a specifically wildlife edition of Countryside Matters for July.

For Somerset as a whole, there has been some very exciting news: the Great White Egrets that have been visiting on the Levels for the last few years have nested successfully. The nest is, sensibly, on Natural England land within a block of land owned by several wildlife charities (Somerset Wildlife Trust included). Three young have fledged successfully! This is not the first heron species to choose the Somerset Levels as their first nesting site in the UK; we must be getting something right out there.

We're all very interested in our owl species, especially Tawny and Barn Owls. The former have had a very poor breeding year, with many young perishing in the wet and cold: they are just a ball of down at first and very vulnerable to such conditions. Many use nest boxes and it appears that the 'chimney' design thought to be suitable for them could exacerbate this problem, with rain getting into the base of the box. It may be that the more enclosed apex-box (normally used for Barn Owls) would increase their survival: and it appears that they will use them perfectly happily when this type is available.

Barn Owls have done rather well this year: there must be a lot of voles, mice and rats out there! My own box has been occupied for the last three years and we got our

timing right this year. When Chris Sperring, who has the relevant licence, came round to check the box we were delighted to see five healthy chicks. By the time you read this they will have flown and, with any luck, the adults will be trying again.

Spotted Flycatchers, along with Swallows, are amongst our summer migrants most likely to be seen around rural houses and farms. They seem to be doing reasonably well this year; although their timing is rather spread out. Those in my garden have just fledged, but I know of others that have only just started to sit on eggs. We're seeing a similar picture with Swallows and with Blue and Great Tits – they've all been early or late. At least the Swallows will probably have several broods, unlike the tits and flycatchers.

Please remember that if you do find any baby birds, or other young animals, not to touch them, unless they are in danger (e.g. in the middle of a road). Usually the parents are nearby and will take care of them. Vets and rescue centres are inundated every year with a whole range of young animals, which probably didn't need rescuing at all.

The hedgerows are looking wonderful at the moment, although they look more mid-May than mid-June. The elder bushes are flowering well and I hope you have all been busy making elderflower fizz as a refreshing summer drink – for when those hot summer days arrive!

Enjoy your summer and the wildlife it brings to our farms and gardens.

Corsley Neighbourhood Watch

Our PCSO Caroline Wright has sent me information about two scams that are currently doing the rounds which you should be made aware of.

We have become aware recently of several scams which, unfortunately for some, have been successful.

Firstly, cold-callers are suggesting that they can reclaim mis-sold PPI insurance payments. The fraudsters call back after a few days and claim that they have found several thousand pounds which is owed to you, but to claim it you have to make an admin payment via Ukash vouchers which can be purchased in many corner shops. The fraudsters will phone and get the voucher numbers, from these they can access the money you have paid, and the fraudsters are untraceable. One victim has lost in excess of £5000 in this scam and worryingly he is now being targeted by probably the same people who now claim they can recover the stolen money.

If you believe you have a claim for mis-sold PPI, you should contact the bank or organisation who sold it to you. They will send you a claim form; any monies due will be refunded to you at no cost.

Secondly, cold callers are phoning victims purporting to be from their own bank, they claim there is a problem with your bank card and this needs to be replaced or you will not be able to access funds in your account. There are several variations on this one but usually they obtain details of the card (but they may already have some of the information) most importantly 3 digit security number on the rear. Once the fraudsters have the security number from

the back they do not need the physical card to obtain cash, goods or services against it. They then have arranged to collect the card or state they will issue a replacement. Again one victim has been defrauded out of several thousand pounds by this means. Unfortunately in this instance the bank will not usually refund any money fraudulently obtained.

Please do not give out any information to anyone who cold-calls you. There are many ways criminals can obtain details about you – when they call they will appear to know information that your bank would have. Terminate the call, ensure you have the dialling tone before you call your bank to check if the call is legitimate.

Many of these calls tend to target the elderly, so please try to make your elderly relatives and neighbours aware of these scams. The Telephone Preference Service (www.tpsonline.org.uk) is a free register that allows you to opt out of receiving unsolicited calls. It does help but unfortunately does not stop calls from overseas where many of these calls originate.

Counselling: What it is and what it isn't

Caroline Le Vine, counsellor at The Corsley Centre

**More thoughts
from the therapy
room. This month:
Myth #4 – Keep
calm and carry on!**

You've failed if you need therapy.

Now that's harsh. Nothing will stop us getting help like the thought of failure. But hang on a moment: can you fix your own car and teeth and boiler? Unlikely, I'd say, that you can do all three (and please give me your number if you can!). Seeking help for those things doesn't make us feel like we've failed, does it? So why is it that seeking help for our emotional difficulties creates this terrible feeling of being somehow less than other people?

Being unhappy and feeling that we aren't coping is a bit of a taboo – we think everyone else is just fine and therefore much stronger/better/more able than we are. If we can't sort it out ourselves, we must be weak and weakness is something to hide. So we dare not seek help... The thing is that most people have periods in their lives when it's hard to cope. We're taught to hide it or we distract ourselves from our difficult feelings (caring for others, alcohol, humour and shopping are common distractions). But they don't simply go away – without resolution, difficult feelings come back to haunt us in some form because they need proper acknowledgement and processing. Just like a physical illness, they're real and need attention.

Without attention, a mild illness can become a major one. Natural feelings of grief and anger at the loss of a loved one, for

example, if they aren't acknowledged, can turn into permanent bitterness, perhaps, or suspicion of the world in general. Therapy can support you when you need it and free you to continue in your life when you're ready. Far from being a failure, seeking help means that you're taking a responsible course of action and doing a bit of maintenance – just like having your car, teeth and boiler looked at periodically.

Elderflower fizz

Making elderflower champagne or cordial is really easy!

Pick half a dozen full elderflower heads ideally on a sunny day when they are most fragrant.

Half fill a clean bucket with 2 gallons (10 litres) of cold water

Dissolve 2lbs (1 kg) of white sugar into the water

Shake any debris and insects clear from the elderflower heads and immerse in the water

Cut two lemons in half squeeze juice into water and throw in the squeezed halves

Add about 4 tablespoons of white wine vinegar

Stir gently and cover with a clean tea towel

Leave for 24 hours, stirring occasionally

After 24 hours, sterilise 10 x 1 litre **plastic carbonated drinks bottles*** (lemonade/pop bottles are ideal) – and strain jugfuls of the liquor through a sieve or muslin cloth into the bottles and screw the plastic tops on firmly.

Leave for a week and the naturally occurring yeast on the elderflower heads begins to ferment with the sugar creating a very weak alcohol content but lots of carbon dioxide.

**Using plastic screw top bottles is highly recommended as using glass bottles is somewhat hazardous! Corks can pop out, glass bottles can explode from the pressure build-up – both leading to an outpouring of lots of sticky liquid! If you use plastic bottles, at least you can see the pressure building – you can either release the gas or just drink it!! Store in a cool place, and unless you've drunk it all by then, it will last until the flowers appear next year!*

Elderflower cordial

1.5 litres of boiling water

1 kilo of white granulated sugar

20 large elderflower heads

4 lemons

55g of citric acid

In a glass bowl (or deep saucepan) pour the boiling water onto the sugar and stir. Leave to cool, stirring every now and then to dissolve the sugar.

When cool add the citric acid, the lemons (zested and sliced) and the elderflower heads.

Leave to steep for 48 hours.

Strain twice through sterilised muslin.

Using a jug and funnel carefully pour into hot sterilised bottles.

Why not get all 'Jamie Oliver' in the garden? You'll benefit from it in the kitchen! If you have a patch of land in your garden that you're not sure what to do with, then how about creating a herb garden?

Herbs can serve lots of different purposes from healing properties to cooking supplements and remedies, but

more importantly in terms of your garden; they smell nice and look good. When planning a herb garden think about the herbs you use most often and consider the

position and aspect you wish to grow them in: it's a myth that all herbs can tolerate full sun.

Commonly used herbs such as sage, thyme and rosemary love full sun however herbs like rocket, parsley and sorrel prefer a partially shaded site. If you're unsure a good way to tell is by a general rule with herbs: If the foliage has a silvery/grey sheen to it then it would prefer a drier, more free draining position.

All herbs are easy enough to grow from seed but if you require a more instant display, ready for use, then all good garden centres stock a range of herbs from which you can choose.

Before buying do some research as each herb has its own use, plants like basil/

oregano are perfect for pastas and tomato based dishes, whereas rosemary is perfect for Sunday roast.

If you don't have the room in the garden for a herb patch, they grow perfectly well in a range of containers; from hanging baskets and window boxes to troughs and tubs. Just remember to water them well in the

hot weather to prevent them drying out and to place them near the door for when you have a stroke of culinary genius...

So rocket off to the garden centre and pick up some parsley!

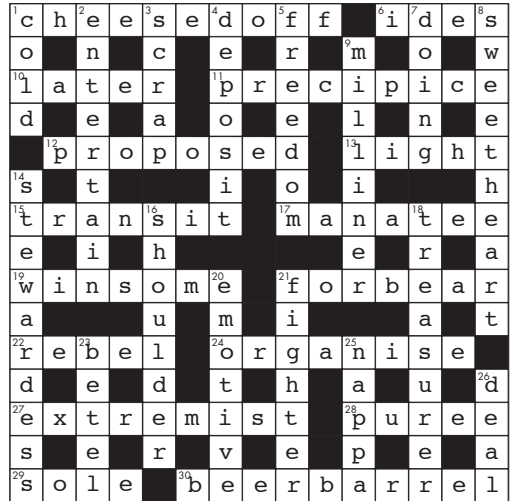
