



Biology: changing the world

Traffic and pollution



A reader has suggested that I write about pollution caused by cars. This has been particularly high profile recently, with the news of the high levels of traffic-generated atmospheric pollution in UK cities, particularly in London, where Brixton Road had already exceeded its ANNUAL limit for 2017 by the 5th January!

Of course, this is an international problem, with many large cities suffering even worse levels of pollution than London. Beijing has one of the highest levels of atmospheric pollution and the authorities there issued a 'red alert' in December 2016, requiring all schools to close and all private cars to stay off the roads for five days. In China the level of air pollution is exacerbated by coalburning power stations, whereas in London it is mainly vehicles that are to blame.

So what about Chapmanslade and Corsley? We are fortunate to live in the country with

fewer cars passing than in the city, but all cars cause atmospheric pollution. Both petrol and diesel engines emit oxides of nitrogen (particularly nitrogen dioxide, NO₂), which can inflame the lining of the lungs, and reduce immunity to lung infections, causing wheezing, coughing, colds and bronchitis. It is thought also to reduce life expectancy, but other pollutants from traffic, such as inhaled particles from tyres and brake linings contribute to this.

Modern petrol cars emit relatively low levels of NO₂, but pre-2005 vehicles may emit much higher levels, particularly those pre-2000. However, diesel vehicles have become MORE polluting, with post-2006 cars emitting over three times the amount of NO₂ than in 1996 and over 12 times more than a post-2006 petrol or petrol-hybrid car. Only recently has this begun to decline. You may remember that Volkswagen provided

software on some diesel cars that reduced the apparent pollution during testing.

Diesel fuel also gives rise to very small particles, less than 2.5 microns (1/400 millimetre). These can get into the lower reaches of the lung and cause respiratory problems, particularly in children but also in adults. The Committee on the Medical Effects of Air Pollutants estimate that on average these particles contribute to 29,000 deaths annually across the UK.

Cars are necessary if we live in the country with a limited bus service. However, if we can minimise their use, not run our engines when stationary for long periods, and ensure our next car is less polluting, we would minimise the damage to our health that they cause.



Phil Jefferson reports on the parish council's activities in February

The parish council met on 16th February. Ten members of the public were present.

Road Safety Outside the School

As you know, over the years there have been numerous attempts to solve the issue of road safety in the High Street, particularly the area outside the school. But so far we seem to have made little progress in finding a solution that everyone is comfortable with and which is capable of being funded and implemented. Some years ago we persuaded Wiltshire Council (and partfunded this ourselves) to provide some traffic calming measures: 'virtual gates' at the eastern end of the village, repeater 30 mph signs, 30 mph roundel and 'SLOW' signs painted on the road surface. And of course we regularly conduct Speedwatch checks at each end of the village.

All of this has helped to slow traffic down but has not led to us finding a permanent solution to the congestion problem. However, the current parish planning exercise, especially the Voice of the Village initiative, has shown that the issue will not go away. And so, at our meeting we discussed what the parish council should do next in an attempt finally to make our High Street safer for everyone – children, parents and village residents.

After a lengthy debate, in which everyone present at the council meeting participated, and many different views were expressed, we agreed that there is no instant solution to the issue. Our High Street will always be busy and is getting busier with 600 or more vehicles an hour passing through at peak times, compared with 300 or so when we started Speedwatch a few years ago. The school is busier too, with over 100 pupils on roll and, of course, the Busy Bees pre-school is a thriving and successful village asset, but it does generate extra traffic.

We did decide, however, that we would investigate thoroughly the possibility of introducing a 'walking bus' arrangement at the Westbury end of the village. A significant number of the school's pupils live in the Westbury area. Legh Walker, at Barters Farm, has kindly offered the use of his car park and there is a continuous footpath from there to the school premises, apart from the Wood Lane junction. We felt there would be value in running this initiative as an experiment, beginning in the summer term or perhaps in September. If successful, it would mean there would be less congestion outside the school, hopefully making the area much safer. At the moment I am discussing the suggestion with the school's

PTFA to try to judge whether or not the proposal will have the support of parents.

Wiltshire Council has announced that, in order to encourage children to walk to school they are prepared to give funds to schools so that a 20 mph speed limit can be introduced in the vicinity of schools. We have not looked at this offer in detail yet but we have, of course, noted that speeding outside the school is not an issue, at least at peak times.

The parish council will continue to monitor the position concerning road safety outside the school and we will report back in due course. If the Barters Farm housing development goes ahead we should have some funds to help us introduce more traffic calming measures in the village. In the meantime, please let us have any ideas or suggestions you may have to help solve the problem.

A dead badger on the road outside the school caused children some distress on two days last month. Various public spirited residents reported this to Wiltshire Council via the "my Wiltshire" app but it took an urgent phone call to Fleur de Rhe Philippe, our Wiltshire Councillor, before it was removed. Our thanks to Fleur for her swift action in responding on our behalf.

Overweight lorries and 7.5 tonne weight limit

The Voice of the Village responses have also raised the issue of heavy goods vehicles (HGVs) using our High Street as a rat-run. At present, the A3098 through Chapmanslade has an 18 tonne weight limit. In simple terms, this means that an HGV with three axles should not be using the High Street unless it is delivering within the area of the weight restriction. Many drivers ignore this restriction, either by accident or design. Often this is because they are using satnavs

designed for use in cars rather than in HGVs. The Local Government Association is currently lobbying the Government to make this practice illegal. As a consequence I have been in touch with Andrew Murrison. our MP, asking him to lend his support to this campaign. You can see my letter, which is posted on the village website.

The parish council has long campaigned for a 7.5 tonne weight limit through the village and will continue to do so. Wiltshire's justification for not doing so is because the junction between the A350 and the A303 north of Shaftesbury is substandard and they are not prepared to introduce lower weight limits for villages such as ours, Corsley and Maiden Bradley until Highways England improves the junction in question. There is no hope of this happening in the near future so the parish council will continue to apply pressure on Wiltshire Council in the hope of a change of mind.

Planning

- 1. We noted that, as we had been told at our November meeting by a representative of Longleat Estates, a planning application has now been submitted for a 240 bed hotel with conference centre, water park and "immersive animal experience" to be located at Tascroft near Warminster. We considered that this would have little impact on our parish in terms of extra traffic but noted that the local economy might benefit once the hotel is opened. You can view the application at 17/01124/OUT on Wiltshire Council's website.
- 2. 17/00258/FUL/ Wood Cottage, 115 High Street. Proposed single storey rear extension and new entrance porch. We considered this planning application and raised no objection to it.
- **3.** Barters Farm development: As I mentioned last month, the parish council



was concerned that we had heard nothing concerning this proposal for many months. We now understand there is a delay in Wiltshire being in a position to issue its new Housing Land Allocation Plan, which apparently accounts for the hiatus. Fleur de Rhe Philippe has indicated that, in principle, if the developer wishes to submit an application and it has the support of the local community, that application might 'succeed against policy'. We will await any developments and keep you informed.

Chapmanslade Plan

Adam reported on progress being made in the current parish planning exercise and mentioned a number of initiatives. First, the long wait for mains gas in the village may be coming to an end. A public meeting is planned for Thursday 23rd March which we hope you will all attend. And second, 4th March has been chosen for the Village Spring Clean, to coincide with a national event which aims to rid our towns, villages and countryside of the mountains of litter which currently are a blight on the landscape. See details of these events elsewhere in The Bridge or on the village website. Finally, Adam gave us a progress report on the possibility of constructing a cycle route between Chapmanslade and Warminster. The village website has full details of progress being made with the plan. Shortly, as part of the planning exercise, you will be receiving a questionnaire asking for your response to a number of issues. We had an overwhelming response from the community when we did this in Chapcap 1 fourteen years ago and we hope for the same this time around.

St Philip and St James' Church

Our village church will be celebrating its 150th anniversary on Monday 1st May. The Parochial Church Council is planning

an afternoon 'Songs of Praise' service, which will be led by the Bishop of Ramsbury and this will be followed by a party. The PCC hopes all the village will join in this celebration. Do you have any treasured memories of the church that you could share with us, or photographs of Sunday School outings, weddings or christenings? An exhibition is being planned and anything you could lend the PCC will be much appreciated. Please contact me or Ian Buick. our churchwarden, if you can help.

Our next scheduled parish council meeting is due to be held in the village hall at 7.30 pm on Thursday 9th March. So, do come along to the meeting if you can, to speak or maybe just to listen.

The **Annual Parish Meeting** will take place on Thursday 13th April. Fleur de Rhe Philippe has promised that she will attend and will respond to any queries you have about Wiltshire Council's services. This is your opportunity to tell the parish and the unitary councils your views on how they are performing, so please mark the date in your diary.

The parish council's April meeting, which follows the Annual Parish Meeting, will be our last before we stand down at the end of our four year term. Some of us will not be offering ourselves as candidates for the next four years so there will be some vacancies. Perhaps you could be one of our next parish councillors and serve the community in this important way? It would be really good if there were enough candidates to warrant an election, so please give it some thought in the next few weeks. We will let you know details of the application procedure shortly.



Seven Open Doors

Dear Friends,

The unfolding seasons of the year are one of the great joys of living in this country I think and similarly I really enjoying the unfolding of the church's year, a year whose colours and themes echo and embrace the earth's seasons.

On the 1st day of March we begin the solemn six-week season of Lent with a service of penitence and ashing on Ash Wednesday. I don't think the word 'penitence' features very heavily in our collective vocabulary these days does it, but whether you believe in God or not there is something incredibly powerful and cathartic about acknowledging our past failings in ritual action, and committing ourselves to a given time of deeper attention and reflection.

The ancient rite of the 'imposition ashes' – marking the sign of the cross in oil and ash on penitents' for-heads – is an incredibly powerful and moving moment and the words that accompany it are equally powerful: 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ'. Crikey, pretty heavy stuff isn't it. But in our achingly beautiful, sad old broken world anybody can see that as human beings we haven't made a very good job of caring for the created order, nor for each other. A reminder that we are 'but dust' is no bad thing I feel because it's a reminder that we are not the centre of the universe and that we need to take responsibility for our actions if we are to go any way towards building a better world. There is another word in there that we rarely use outside of church, 'sin'. Now I would be the first person to say that the Church has been a bit too focused on sin over the centuries to the detriment of God's message of grace and love. But, a bit of self-examination and a realisation of our own shortcomings before we get to the Easter promise of resurrection and hope is no bad thing. One of the prayers in the service talks about God rescuing us from 'the chaos of sin'; we do need rescuing from the mess we create do we not?

It's good to gather together to discuss and our thoughts and feelings so as usual over Lent we will be running our Lent Course. This year we will be using a course entitled 'Christ and the Chocolaterie' which was inspired by the film 'Chocolat'. We'll be using clips from the film to stimulate our discussions about God, the world and ultimately what it means to be human. And yes I know traditionally people give up chocolate for Lent; personally I've never found that a very helpful thing to do as I then spend the whole time desperately craving it which is totally counter productive. Rather, I prefer to do something positive to deepen my relationship with God or think of something really lovely to do for people who are not so well. Do come along and join in, you don't have to have come to church, we'd love to see you, and there will be chocolate-themed refreshments on offer too.

A social skittles evening for members and partners has been arranged for **Friday 24th**





Corsley Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Neil Britten reports on the parish council's activities in February

There was one occasional meeting in February to deal with two planning applications and applications from Village organisations for grants and donations, plus updates on routine ongoing issues.

Planning applications

16/11626/FUL

Extension to existing garage to form garage with attached farm office and additional storage.

This application relates to Malthouse Farm, Court Lane and sought permission to construct a sinale storey timber clad office cum store-room at the rear of, and attached to, the existing double garage. The application also included blocking in the existing garage double door and replacing it with an new double door and windows to match the farmhouse. The garage would be used to house dog kennels.

No representations had been received and the PC resolved to support the application. It has now been approved subject to standard conditions including a limitation of the number of kennels to six, above which change of use should be sought.

16/11254/FUL

Recladding of existing main and secondary entrance of the Plaza building, Located centrally within the Center Parcs Longleat Forest site. Cladding to include red render, timber cladding and timber slats, to be in line with current Center Parcs branding located centrally within the Center Parcs Lonaleat Forest site.

This building is just inside the boundary of Corsley Parish, well inside the Centre Parcs site and not visible from points outside. No representations had been received and the PC resolved to offer no objection to the application.

Tascroft Court

We have now received notification of Longleat's outline planning application for this development, comprising a 240 bed hotel and other attractions, and there will be a PC meeting early in March to consider the plans. Please watch village noticeboards for the date/time of this meeting and come to the meeting if you wish to hear more. It should be noted that this development lies outside the Corsley Parish boundary, but will be visible from points inside. There could also be impact on the traffic flow along the A362 between the Warminster bypass and Picket Post roundabout.

Grants and donations

Three applications had been received:

Corsley and Chapmanslade Parochial Church Council (CPCC) - a grant towards ongoing maintenance costs for St Margaret's churchyard (amount unspecified).

Reading Room – help to defray general running costs for the hall (amount unspecified). Corsley War Memorial Playing Field contribution to insurance costs.

Each applicant had provided full accounts and, following the reduction in the PC contribution to the broadband project, there was a total of around £3.5K available for grants and donations, as originally budgeted.

It was agreed that £1000 be donated to the Corsley War Memorial Playing Field, £1200 to CPCC and £1200 to the Corsley Reading Rooms.

Broadband

This should be the last of the PC briefs on this topic, as the project to fill the broadband 'gap' is now in the hands of BT Openreach and Corsley Broadband Ltd (CBBL), the company set up to deal with BT. The latter is guite independent of the Parish Council and updates should be available on the Corsley Broadband website (details published in earlier editions of The Bridge, from Wiltshire on Line and BT Openreach sites.

As far as the PC is concerned, its contribution has been received by CBBL, and the Company has, in turn, handed over the full amount of the Corsley contribution to the gap cost to BT Openreach. The latest information from BT puts activation of the area covered by gap in the final quarter of this year.

Annual Parish Meeting

The date for this meeting is now fixed as Monday 13th March and there is a notice elsewhere in this edition of The Bridge giving details. As previously reported, Longleat will give us a presentation on their rapidly developing plans for both the existing and new attractions. They have some exciting projects in the pipeline which should come to fruition next year and Bob Montgomery, CEO, has agreed to come and speak,

along with his business development consultant, Geoffrey Wheating. The Tascroft Court development will be included in this presentation. He will also be very happy to answer questions on any other Longleat issues that affect Corslev.

The Annual Parish Meeting does not have to be exclusively based around Longleat's contribution and any additional inputs from village organisations are welcome. It is not too late for any additional contributions; please contact either myself or John Willcox if you have any specific inputs.

Parish Elections

Time is marching on and, by the time that this edition of The Bridge goes out, there will be a little over two months to ao before the elections on 8th May. The notice seeking nominations is published again elsewhere in this edition of The Bridge and will be repeated in the April edition.

Anyone over the age of 18, and who has appropriate residential/place of work/electoral role qualifications can be nominated and courses explaining the role and responsibilities of councillors are available, paid for by the PC, after election. If you are at all interested, then please contact myself, or any of the sitting councillors, or come along to a PC meeting.

Streetscene

A few highlights from Simon Jasper:

Geys Hill: passing place to be completed 10-18 February (now completed).

Sturford Lane/A362 junction: adjustment to lining and additional signing to improve safety at the junction will be done, with a financial contribution from the PC

Signs: reported and awaited for Whitbourne Moor (bend); Fuzzy Hill A362 junction; Dertford finger post; The Hollow – passing

place sign. The A362 temporary reflector has been reported again.

Sturford Lane: mud removal by volunteers, hedge cutting from Longleat and potholes. Work ongoing.

Corsley Heath: triangle cut; Reading Room to Royal Oak – turf cut back and removed, widening path significantly, hedge trimmed where necessary; TMTI/White Horse Motors verge: mud and weeds removed.

Corsley St Margaret's: verge and drains cleared and spoil spread.

The Hollow: passing place cleared of six inches of mud.

Parish Steward: six days work so far – two days a month (one of the few villages to be given two days). He completes tasks against our priority task list which is updated monthly. Work completed so far:

Ditches, grips and drain covers (the biggest, ongoing task).

Annual effort in Temple to clear vegetation from large ditches and keep culverts running.

Grass control at Sturford Lane A362 exit to ensure visibility.

Bus shelters swept.

Bay Tree development

We have had updates from Wiltshire on progress with the Bay Tree development and here are two extracts from recent emails from Andrew Mead, the Commissioning Officer for the project:

"Full Planning Package ready to be submitted for some time now (since last summer) and have been waiting on an Environment Agency Permit for approval of the on-site drainage proposals. This has taken some time and much work to

receive, however the draft permit was indeed received late last week. It is now safe to say the Environment Agency will grant permission to our drainage proposals and I will therefore now have a conversation with our build team and Architect shortly about submitting the Planning Application imminently". (Dated 7th February 2017)

"In addition to the planning application, we previously discussed the provision of a footpath to the recreation ground, an upgrade to the nearby crossing point on the A362 and installation of bus stops close by to the development. With these in mind, I have attached my notes on the proposals (as these measures fall outside the submitted planning submission), however rest assured should we be successful in receiving planning approval, I will progress accordingly as detailed within the attachments." (Dated 16th February 2017)

PC consideration of the planning application is likely to be the subject of a occasional meeting, though I have asked Andrew MEAD to try and give us maximum notice so as to allow us to give maximum notice of the meeting.

Chapmanslade Plan Update

The Chapmanslade Plan Steering Group has been very busy gathering and collating all the feedback we have had from the community. The full list can be found on the village website (www.chapmanslade.org.uk). The questionnaire is still being assembled and has already gone through several drafts. It is taking a bit longer than we originally anticipated but we have only one chance to get it right. This delay is not stopping some of the initiatives progressing and I have detailed some below.

We have been really lucky to receive some help from some talented villagers. They have come up with some fantastic ideas to approach the challenges we have, and brilliant suggestions about the way we can get everyone involved. More details on this over the coming months.

Litter

One of our first activities is Chapmanslade's involvement in the Great British Litter Pick. Taking place at 2.30pm on 4th March we will gather at the Three Horseshoes and then send teams out along sections of the High Street and into the side streets and the village hall playing field. At most we intend to spend only one hour so we will need lots of help to make sure we get our village looking really good.

Mains Gas

This is once again back on the agenda, at the last attempt we secured 56 interested households, only three short of the required 59. We have started the process again and this time we are holding an information evening at Chapmanslade Village Hall on 23rd March between 6.30m and 9pm.

Wales and West Utilities staff will be in attendance with displays showing design plans, budget costs and details about the Warm Homes Assistance grant. We will also have several local gas heating installers who will be able to provide advice about individual properties and systems. All of this will be accompanied by tea and cakes. Around the same time Chapmanslade residents will receive a letter asking them to indicate an interest in having mains gas connected. Hedgerow flowers

Did you see the splendid display of snowdrops in the village throughout February? Patches of them were everywhere and not a hamlet seemed to be without their share. At the Chapel, we always have a plentiful display of snowdrops, but this year they looked more widespread than ever. We used daffodils in our window displays last month, though they were shop-bought; however, the leaves of the wild daffodils are through the surface and several inches tall, so we're hoping for a good display of golden flowers in the coming weeks.

At the end of March, the Gill Redman holiday season begins, with a trip to Lake Garda in northern Italy. I already know the flowers in bloom, round the lake, will be pansies and the tulips will be going over, even though the Lake isn't far from the Dolomites, which will still be snow-covered. Antirrhinums will also star in flower beds, but I've never seen a daffodil there.

Mr Jim Short from Clink Evangelical Church was one of our February preachers. Jim's a member of the Gideon Prison Prayer partnership and talked to us about his work with the inmates of Guy's Marsh prison at Shaftesbury. Jim also brought us the latest copy of 'Gideon News' and I read about the International Scripture Blitz to Uganda, by a group of Gideons; I also studied the many photos accompanying the report. No daffodils are evident in any of the pictures,

in fact, no flowers at all. Trees are abundant and some grass, but no blooms. Although there's plenty of greenery, ten million people in Uganda have no access to clean water. It seems impossible to me, when I can turn on a tap and get clean water at will, that in some countries, such a thing isn't possible. In Uganda's bush communities, water - not necessarily clean – is carried from source to home by women, in faded yellow water carriers on their heads.

I'll try, in future, to think of those women when I turn on the chapel taps to top up the flower vases, or to fill the kettles for the preservice teas and coffees. I'll also thank God, each time, for our access to clean water, and for the colours of nature available to us in Britain.



Tales from the passenger seat



There are many myths abound regarding easy methods of learning to drive and just as many on what to do to pass the test. I have heard various tricks, dodges and what you must or must not do in order to get a licence.

Fridays: never take a test on a Friday, because if the examiners have passed too many people that week, they have to fail everyone on a Friday. Hmmm, that's strange, having taught 3698 people, I think I would have worked it out not to take any pupils for a test on a Friday...

Wear something smart... er no, actually it's best to wear something practical and comfortable that you are used to driving in.

Don't take a test in the afternoon, because if they've passed people in the morning, they have to fail the afternoon people. Or, it's best to take the test in the afternoon. because if the examiner has had a nice lunch, they will be better disposed towards passing you.

The examiners have to fail a certain number of people to keep their fail statistics accurate. 

A view from over the hedge...

Countryside Matters

Mid February and already the birds are chattering away. A lot of their natural food has now been eaten so it's even more important to put out bird food and check water bowls regularly.

Wow! Can you remember when our hedgerows and verges looked so good? The snowdrops are so bright and cheerful even on a miserable day – we are so fortunate that over the years they have multiplied either by airborne seed or natural division of the bulbs. The soil where they grow is free-draining with lots of leafmould from trees and hedges feeding the bulbs for better displays year-on-year.

By the time this edition of The Bridge lands on our doorsteps we will be enjoying some wonderful displays of daffodils on the verges - some were planted for the Millennium and, thanks to donations from the Parish Council and the Elizabethan Evening Committee (and the volunteers who planted them) we have even more to enjoy this year!

Watching the news this morning, I was reminded of the concerns of dog walkers and farmers, especially here in the countryside. Even the best behaved dogs, if not on a lead, could run off to play with other animals. Sadly, their play will not be understood by heavily pregnant sheep or those protecting their young lambs; cattle can turn from docile animals to being aggressive in a matter of moments and can turn on dogs and their owners. Dogs

worrying sheep and cattle is a matter of great concern and in extreme circumstances they could be shot; as the dog walker on the TV report said, it is not the dog's fault – it is the owner of the dog who fails to keep it under control.

This winter has made life hard for poultry keepers with avian flu being carried over from Europe. Hopefully, with migrating birds retuning to their summer homelands, our free range poultry will once again be able to enjoy the freedom of outside life.

Do enjoy the beauty of our countryside this month even if those March winds are blowing. Look out for cock pheasants as they put on their finest feathers and display themselves and call out to all the rather plainer hen pheasants. If you are really lucky you may also see hares boxing - a sight well worth standing quietly to watch.

Give your lawn some love

Now's the perfect time of year to improve your lawn and, with the Easter bank holiday just around the corner, there's no reason not to get out into the garden and give your lawn some love and attention.

If the lawn is more than four years old you may start to see weeds which have self germinated such as dandelions, clover, etc. Also in poorly drained areas of the lawn you may see moss.

There are lots of products on the market to help improve your lawn either by conditioning it or by removing problematic weeds.

A great place to start is with a Weed, Feed and Moss killer, which does exactly what it says, handling all three tasks in one go. However sometimes this three-in-one application can fail to deal with persistent weeds.

My tip is to use the Weed, Feed and Moss killer initially to kill off the moss and less established weeds, as well as feed the lawn followed by an application of Doff Lawn Spot Weeder" to kill back those more troublesome weeds.

If your lawn is very old and contains more than a third of moss then I would recommend hiring a scarifier which will pull up all the unwanted moss. Once the lawn has been scarified, rake up the moss and clear it from the lawn. By scarifying you also help aeration of the lawn, it also lifts grass which has grown horizontally, encouraging upright growth which can be chopped back when you next mow.

Repairing your lawn

- If your Lawn has become patchy and bare in places then you may consider re-sowing with grass seed or for instant results; turfing.
- To seed a bare patch you need to lightly dia over the area, rake flat and remove any stones. Lightly consolidate and rake again to loosen the surface, broadcast good quality lawn seed followed by Growmore fertiliser, water well. The seed should germinate within a week, keep moist for best results.
- To turf a bare patch or disused piece of ground carry out the same level of preparation, unroll and lay turf in strips, staggering the joints. Use planks to walk on the turf which will aid good root to soil contact, ensuring quick rooting. Water well and prevent from drying out, keep everybody off for up to 3 weeks to prevent damage to the newly rooted turf.
- With any new lawn ensure that the grass is moved slightly longer than normal so that the new grass can shade itself and stop itself drying out. If you have a dog who likes to wee on the lawn then by add Tomato juice to the dogs water bowl this will stop any burn marks on the new lawn caused by the dogs wee.
