Road closure

Temporary Closure of: A362 (Part), Corsley and Somerset County Council (Ref: TTRO 7202)

Notice is hereby given that the Wiltshire Council and Somerset County Council has made an Order to close temporarily to all traffic –A362 (Part) from its junction with Corsley Heath to its junction with Friggle Street. To enable Wiltshire Council to carry out carriageway resurfacing, road marking and adjustment of ironworks.

Alternative route: via A362 (unaffected length) – A361 - A36 - A362 (unaffected length) and vice versa.

The closure and diversion route will be clearly indicated by traffic signs.

This Order will come into operation on **25 May 2021** and the closure will be required between the hours of **7 pm and 6 am** until **2nd June 2021**. It is anticipated that the works will take the stated duration to complete depending upon weather conditions. Access will be maintained for residents and businesses where possible, although delays are likely due to the nature of the works.

Mobile library re-opens

Third time lucky?

Following the lifting of government restrictions, Wiltshire's Mobile Library service resumed operating in April. The Mobile Library service is operating as before the last lockdown. Dates and times of all Mobile Library stops are available online via the website www.wiltshire.gov.uk/libraries and from printed timetables available from the Mobile Library. We look forward to seeing all of our customers when we next visit you.

As with shops, the Mobile Libraries are required to continue to operate as they were before the lockdown, so customers and staff will need to wear a face covering, hand-sanitiser will be available at the door, test and trace details will be recorded and access will be limited to one customer at a time. These public health precautions are currently required because although increasing numbers of people have had vaccines there is still a risk (albeit reduced) of infection and transmission, and to avoid new variants causing a further lockdown the instruction for the moment is to 'act like you haven't had a jab'. Please also be aware that due to continuing parking issues with increased numbers of people still working from home the Mobile Library may not always be able to stop in the usual place in the village. However, whatever the future holds, the Mobile Library managers will endeavour to get books through to you! Please look out for them and come and say hello. If you've never used the Mobile Library before it's free

to join and you can use your membership card in any Wiltshire library or online to access free eBooks and eMagazines.

Orchard News



With the blossom coming out, the orchard will be looking its best this month as the different trees compete to attract bees and other pollinators. The newly laid hedge is also coming into blossom.

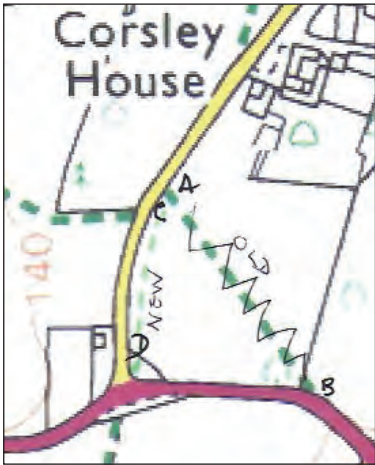
Current figures for April suggest we have only had 10% of the normal rainfall so this weekend we have had to water the newly-planted trees. We will continue to do this every couple of weeks if required. With new trees it is best to give a large drink infrequently to encourage roots to go down to the water table rather than developing surface roots.

We will continue to mow a path around the orchard to allow everyone to enjoy a stroll and sit down on the bench. However, the badgers from the corner of the old school field do seem to have spread further into the orchard area so just keep a look out for holes and be careful not to put a foot down one.

Footpath re-route at Corsley House

The Footpath A-B diagonally across the front of Corsley House has been moved. The stile at the junction with the A363 was considered to be very dangerous. The new route C-D links to the footpath down to Temple and also it avoids using Deep Lane which can be difficult if you meet large or fast vehicles.

Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Councillor Charlie Thackway reports on the Parish Council's April activities

Chapmanslade Parish Council (PC) met virtually on Thursday 8th April, chaired by Councillor John Lewis. There were 6 councillors present and two members of the public. It is expected that face to face meetings in the Village Hall will restart with the PC AGM following the May elections (TBC).

Dog Bins

The issue of clearing dog faeces was considered and it was noted that there are no longer any specific Dog Bins but litter bins can be used to dispose of bagged dog faeces. WCC will empty existing Dog Bins/Litter Bins and replace damaged bins but will no longer supply new bins or take responsibility for emptying such. If dog faeces are left on pavements the incident can be reported on My Wiltshire by members of the public and the Council will clear.

End of Year Accounts and Audit

The End of Year Accounts as of 31st March 2021 were agreed and the internal audit arranged.

Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Consultation

The PC, led by Councillor Bell, considered the Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue consultation, which can be accessed by members of the public via the following link: consultation@dwfire.org.uk. In response, the PC will submit the following response. Chapmanslade welcomes and encourages:

- all targeted fire prevention work for our vulnerable and elderly residents
- all targeted work to promote/support well-being and crime prevention
- the planned broader approach to partnership work with NHS, Police and other social care/crime prevention authorities etc
- Fire and Rescue 'Safe & Well' visits to Chapmanslade School (& Busy Bees Nursery and neighbouring Berkley School)
- support from the Fire & Safety service regarding road safety education and preventative initiatives in the village which will reduce the risk of road traffic accidents
- Fire and Rescue involvement/presence at any planned Chapmanslade community events
- Any public information articles in The Bridge
- details in the plan regarding Governance, People and planned work to further reduce the carbon footprint of the Fire and Rescue service and to increased environmental protection across the County.

Barters Farm Development

Following the PC consultation with the History Group and the children of Chapmanslade School the following names were approved by WCC:

Barters Drive, for the main road through the estate and Honey Gardens, proposed by the children of Chapmanslade School, to

reflect the Bee Friendly village, and Barnard Close in recognition of the long-standing commitment to the community of members of the Barnard family.

No other information on the development had been received, but it was noted that the intention is for this development to be a zero-carbon project.

Parish Steward

Councillor Thackway (CT) reported that the flooding issues in Huntenhull Lane in the vicinity of the Old Rectory are being addressed and the PC will continue to monitor the situation for WCC to complete the drain clearance more frequently. The Parish Steward has cleaned the village road signs, filled some potholes and unblocked drains in Huntenhull Lane on his recent monthly visit. Items for next month should be forwarded to CT.

Planning Applications

21/01868/FUL Thoulstone Farm BA13 4AQ. Landscaping works to a walled garden to include paving, tiered planting beds, hot tub and freestanding sauna pod.
No objections were raised to this application.

Consultation-20/11402/LBC (Alt/EXT) Thoulstone farm BA213 4AQ. Proposed overlaying of existing timber floors with loose lay proprietary flooring system.
No objections were raised to this application.

Annual Parish Meeting

The next meeting is planned for **29th April 2021** at 7 pm. This meeting will be the Annual Parish Meeting which is an open meeting and an opportunity for members of the community to raise issues and put points of view. Dear Friends,

As I write it is just over a week after Easter Day, which came very early this year, almost as early as it can be, even so, Spring has sprung and the natural world seems to be heralding what Christ Jesus has done for us in dying on the cross and rising to new life. The old has gone, the new has come with the Resurrection coinciding with the Jewish Festival of First Fruits, the first of the harvest offerings, given in thanks to God and trust that there would be a greater abundance to follow – this in not accidental. Jesus in his Resurrection is a sign for us that there is life – new life and when we trust in what he has done to show us the way to new life we become part of God's new creation. I love to see how even some of the most dilapidated buildings can be brought to life and ready to be lived in again by someone who can see its potential and is prepared to take a chance on it – bidding at an auction and then devoting time and energy (not to mention money) in renovating a broken-down dwelling and making it whole again – giving it new life, new creation!

This had me reflecting on how we can be like those broken-down dwellings, the damp and peeling plaster, dry rot, leaking pipes, the dated fixtures and fittings etc. etc. representing the things that have caused us to feel broken, rundown, perhaps rejected and unloved. Some properties are spruced up fairly quickly with fresh décor and an updated kitchen and bathroom, but others need much more radical attention. Depending on what is the cause of our brokenness we will need more or less attention to be ready to live again to the full. Who will take a chance on us? Jesus! Be the highest bidder and pay the price? Jesus! Devote their whole life to healing us and making us whole – new life, new creation? Jesus! This is the message of Easter, only the One who created in the first place can see the potential that exists in each one of us. God paid the highest price for us by becoming one with us in human flesh, Jesus the Son of God, and opened the way for us to be restored to new life – new creation! What a blessing! if you are reading this and thinking you would like to know more or simply in need of someone to chat with do let us know!

Corsley Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Chairman, Neil Britten, rounds up the PC's activity in April

The May elections will be imminent by the time this edition of The Bridge is distributed and this is the last brief on the activities of the current Parish Council (PC), who will be succeeded on 10th May by the new team.

Four of the present Councillors will be retiring – myself, Judith Helliard, Simon Jasper and Gill Parkinson - and there are seven nominations for the new PC, including three newcomers. As there are nine seats, there will thus be no election and, assuming no last minute withdrawals, all seven will be deemed to have been elected. The **Annual Parish Council Meeting** will take place on the **10th May** at which new Chair and Vice Chair will be elected. It is anticipated that the two vacancies can be filled by co-option.

In the meantime, April has been a busy month with two occasional meetings on the 6th and 26th April (at the time of writing, the latter hasn't yet taken place, but has been scheduled to wrap up any outstanding issues before the new PC takes office). This brief concentrates on the 6th April meeting which, as usual, was convened primarily to deal with two planning applications and updates on other current issues.

Planning Applications

21/02027/FUL - Rose Cottage, Lyes Green.

Proposed subdivision of dwelling into two dwellings, extensions and associated works

The proposal is for development of the building into two adjoining three bedroom dwellings, by construction of two rearward

gables. The frontage and existing structure of the Cottage will remain substantially unchanged with shared parking and access for both dwellings to the south west side of the Cottage, as now. The cottage had, in the past, been two dwellings and is not presently habitable without significant development.

Discussion largely centred on the safety and highway issues relating to entry and egress from the site because of the narrowness of the road and the poor visibility to the north. The PC agreed No Objection to this application, but registered significant concerns about the road safety issues. The proposal must be 'signed off' by Highways with conditions applied to ensure that the access is made as safe as possible.

21/02057/FUL- Corsley House. *Provision of timber fence on southern boundary for sound reduction purposes with landscape screening*

This application is for a two metre high wooden fence, from a point just north of the Deep Lane/A362 junction, along the southern boundary of the estate following the line of the A362 and then north for a short distance along the eastern boundary. The purpose of the fence is to reduce transmission of A362 traffic noise to the house and is intended to achieve much the same as the previously planned bund, rejected on appeal in 2020. The fence will be substantially hidden from view by existing trees and hedges augmented by additional planting.

The PC Council agreed No Objection to

this application and to remind the planning authority of the comments made when the application for the earth bund was put in, namely:

“that no residential properties should be affected by any increased noise resulting from the presence of the fence because of the potential for noise reflection south across the A362. To this end the PC’s “no objection” is conditional on the presentation, before the fence is constructed, of a comparison between existing noise levels along the proposed fence and predictions, based on a credible modelling exercise, of the post fence situation, particularly the extent to which properties on the south of the A362 will be affected.”

Replacement of the Corsley Heath bus stop shelter

The PC has budgetary provision up to approximately £6k for the replacement. Neil Carpenter had prepared provisional costings and sketch plans for a replacement shelter and this was considered against some alternative ‘off the shelf’ options. The PC consensus was that the shelter should be in keeping with the village setting, ie stone and timber construction with a pitched tile roof and tasked Neil to work with John White and Gill Parkinson to develop a fully costed proposal for approval.

Annual Parish Meeting

Under the current COVID-19 restrictions, the rules for Annual Parish Meetings (APM) remain somewhat opaque. Nominally, the meeting should take place between the 1st March and 1st June each year. However, some guidance suggests that the deadline is 30th June and some that a village assembly could take place at any point in the year and could replace an APM if other circumstances make it impossible to stage an effective meeting by the deadline.

An online APM could legally take place up until 7th May, but would be impractical to manage, unlikely to attract a wide audience and thus unsatisfactory, particularly noting

also the two key current village issues. The future of the Reading Room and the proposed Hares development on the show field, are both likely to stimulate serious and wide interest and a face-to-face APM is the ideal forum from which the PC can gauge village feelings on both these issues. If the APM is to be held face-to-face, then, of necessity, it could only take place when a suitable venue is available, ie one which can seat sufficient numbers. The Reading Room could be fully available after 21st June (50% capacity 17th May to 21st June), although the published availability is 1st July. St Margaret’s church is another potential venue, but its availability has yet to be confirmed.

It was concluded that a final decision on the APM date should therefore be delayed until the new PC is in place, when there should be more clarity of the issues at stake.

Farewell

This my 88th and last brief for The Bridge. I made the mistake this morning of looking back over the first two or three years worth and then realised that an hour or so had gone by when I should have been concocting this one! What became clear, however, was the enduring nature of PC business, the breadth of issues faced and, most importantly, the ongoing commitment and engagement of the current team. They have turned out at all times of the year, in fair weather and foul, often at short notice and put up with meetings which have, at times, been long and challenging. To all of them, and our long suffering Parish Clerk, John Willcox I must record my most sincere thanks for their contribution to the village over the last 12 years.

I would also like to express my appreciation of village engagement in the various public meetings that have taken place over the years and the positive and enlightening input to some of the knottier issues which have

popped up. The attendance at Annual Parish Meetings has always been very gratifying and I noted in one of the back issues that we had 80 people at one of the early the APMs where the possibility of developing a Neighbourhood Plan was vigorously debated (and rejected).

My thanks to one and all and I wish all success to the new team.

Memories of Corsley School

First term

David Ball recalls his tenure as Headteacher at Corsley School...

My first term at Corsley School was going well and as half term approached the whole school (all 39 children plus their teachers) were going to Warminster by coach one afternoon just before the half term holiday. We had been invited to watch a production by a travelling theatre company at New Close School. It was suitable for the whole primary age range and we were leaving straight after lunch and returning just in time for the end of the school day. What could possibly go wrong?

During my teaching career I frequently organised educational visits, visitors and residential trips – for several years I took 50 children to Wembley Stadium to watch schoolboy internationals with more than 50,000 spectators! I had taken children for weeks at residential centres, theatre trips, museum visits, sports events, music festivals, chess tournaments plus of course visits from musicians, actors, novelists, poets and sportsmen and women which brought education to life and made learning a memorable experience. I never failed to return to school with the same number of children I took away in more than 38 years of teaching and the following events explain why my colleagues often thought I was neurotic about checking group numbers!

In that first term (Summer Term 1986) as Head of Corsley School, as I got off the coach at the school gates after the trip, a mum waiting at the gate glared at me and



said “You’re in trouble, you are” and another voice very calmly said, “Mr. Ball, could I have a quick word?” It was Cathy Horsfall, mother of Deborah. “Did you know you left Debs locked in the school while you all went off to Warminster?” I have no idea how she managed to sound so calm, controlled and polite given the circumstances! Debs was in Mrs. Laing’s class and it turned out that she had popped into the toilets just before her class and mine boarded the bus, the infants were already on board. As I locked the outer school doors I had called out “Is there anybody in here” and hearing no answer I locked the double doors and off we went. Nobody had noticed that Debs was missing even when we returned to school after the performance. It was every teachers worst nightmare and I couldn’t believe this had happened.

I remember apologising profusely, praising Debs for her calm and sensible behaviour and promising to find out how it had happened. Debs had not heard me call and came out of the toilets to find everyone gone and the doors locked. She quickly realised what had happened and went to the office to ring her mum, but unfortunately the office door was also locked so she couldn't get to the telephone. After some thought she did manage to open the locked double doors by pulling back the top and bottom bolts and pushing the two doors outwards, which gave her access to the outdoors and that was where Cathy had found her when she came to collect at the end of the day!

Straight after school I drove into Warminster and bought a medal in a presentation box and that evening drove over to the Horsfalls house to apologise to Debs and her mum and dad, and present her with the medal for remaining so cool and sensible that afternoon. I was expecting a frosty reception, (to say the least!) but the whole family were warm and welcoming and after discussing the afternoons events over a glass of wine in the summer sunshine we all parted amicably. My wife and I became good friends with the Horsfall family and I'm pleased to report that Debs was not too traumatised by the experience she is now - a primary school teacher! It's not something you ever forget though, and when Jan and I were invited to Deborah's wedding many years after the event, Dave Horsfall took great delight in relating the whole sad tale to all the guests at the reception, much to my embarrassment and shame!

Walking through lockdown

Seeking Robin Hood!



My navigation skills are suspect, but I don't think we live near Nottingham! For this walk, locate Five Ash Lane, on the Warminster to Shaftesbury road; the turning left is beside Wylde Valley Vineyard. The lane is narrow and twisting; drive past Job's Mill, on the right, and up the winding hill. Once on the flat, you'll see a pull-in on the right, and a household's red postbox in the clearing on your left.

You'll need your wellies for this walk! Step round the iron barrier into Southleigh Woods (beside the car pull-in) and stay on the trail to start, walking straight ahead. There are off-tracks left and right here, at regular intervals, so exploration is possible – and you shouldn't get TOO lost!

After one hundred yards or so, you'll find your first cross-tracks. Keep them in mind for further exploration – the turning right takes you to a lower slope of the site, where the trees may be descendants of original Selwood Forest ones. The track's best explored when bluebells are out, so around now! It takes you along the back of Job's Mill and eventually curves uphill again onto the main track used for this outing.

For now, stay on the main track and keep walking forward, though you'll find more cross-tracks at regular intervals here. Areas of this woodland have been replanted with saplings, whole plantations dressed in green tubes. The first replanted area's on your left, with clear ground on the right and a view across to Cley Hill and Little Cley; there's also a view of outer Warminster.

Past the area of cleared ground on the right, you'll see the remaining full-size trees are firs. Pause at the next cross-tracks and you should notice that a couple of the firs are taller, a different shape and more majestic than the rest. Twenty years ago or more, there was one of these majestic firs at each corner of every cross-track; I think they were planted in the 1850s and are all that remains of proper 'carriage rides' through the woods. There were once 'markers' like these in the woods behind Shearwater Lake, too; both areas belong to Longleat.

Eventually, you'll reach yet another cross-track and see a change in terrain. Go straight ahead on a muddy track, not a solid one. The track goes into a field, while there are narrow side trails here, right and left; there should



be bluebells about. Just for interest's sake, go through the metal gate (it squeaks horribly!) into the field and you'll find a waterworks site on the right, Sandhill Reservoir. Another time, cross the field, go through the big gate at the end and walk the hard road into Longbridge Deverill.

For this walk, turn left before the squeaking gate, and join the narrow track through more woodland, with plenty of shade, bird song, bluebells and wood anemones; perfect! Meander along, till the path meets a hard wide track, then turn right. Eventually you'll reach a junction, not cross-tracks. Turn LEFT here; don't go

ahead as the track ends up in the working area for a smallholding.

The turning left takes you back to Five Ash Lane, but we'll return to the car by a different route, as we haven't found Robin Hood! About the third or fourth turning left on this wide hard track will be a very muddy one, with two huge tree trunks across



it. Divert along here (not without wellies, mind!) and you'll be in a copse of Monkey Puzzle trees, planted in the Victorian era, probably as added interest for the carriage rides; this is Robin Hood's Bower. You won't find men in Lincoln Green, but it's a lovely area and a change from the usual fir trees.

Keep walking and squelching ahead and you'll see a huge tree trunk blocking the trail's end; scramble over that and you're back on your first wide hard track. Turn right and return to your car. This is a shortish walk (say two miles), but the opportunities to explore are endless, so enjoy! If

you're desperate for facilities and refreshments after, return to the Warminster-Shaftesbury road and head left till you see the entrance to the Lakeside Garden Centre, on your left in Crockerton; the café should re-open May 17th (I think, as I'm struggling more with the 'Roadmap' than with a road map!).

Behind the Hedge

The Secrets of Corsley House now revealed



Corsley House, near Longleat, started life as a picturesque farmhouse in the early 18th century, resembling a fairy tale castle with its leaded windows and stone turrets. In 1812 the prosperous Barton family hired the renowned Bath Architect John Pinch the elder to add a substantial Greek revival addition lending the house a unique character with one entrance feeling much older than the other.

Most of the outbuildings at Corsley House have been unaltered including a lovely apple store with its original interior and a listed grain store built on staddle stones. The real gem of the garden is the walled garden with its spectacular view of Cley Hill. The garden, which has been returned to its former glory, would have kept the family and staff

substantially self-sufficient all year long. A new addition to the grounds is the wave lawn which undulates along the Georgian side of the house.

For the first time in decades Corsley House is opening its gardens to the public. Come and Step Back in Time on Sunday 18th July, a chance to see the vernacular kitchen garden outbuildings and to imagine how it once was. Guided tours of the gardens, Frome's Rye Bakery's Woodfired Pizzas, a Pimm's Bar, Tea and Coffee, Children's entertainment and much more. A view from over the hedge...

Countryside Matters

Spring has definitely sprung!

As I write it is 5am on the 19th April. The air outside is a chilly 3°C and dawn is due at 6.05am with the sounds of bird life and farm life filling the air.

I can hear the sound of the milking machine and the call of the recently calved cows calling their calves to let them know they are on their way in from the fields.

At 5.15am the dawn chorus is in full swing and the mist is lifting to show a crisp white frost settling on the ground.

Blackbirds are the first to start their singing and usually the last of the day with their cheerful call. In the distance I hear the cock pheasant calling, warning the other cock birds to keep away from the hen pheasants now nestled in undergrowth sitting on their eggs.

The woodpecker swoops back in to the pine tree and continues its repetitive tapping with its beak foraging bugs to feed its young.

Pigeons, stock doves and collared doves coo and, in the distance, swans, duck and wild geese leave their sleeping quarters and nesting partners to fly to larger pools and lakes.

The engines of the huge tractors start up, couple-up with the equipment to be used today; manure and slurry spreading has filled our nostrils for the last few weeks as the grassland and cereal land is naturally fertilised. Now the grass is harrowed and rolled to spread clumps of manure and mole heaps evenly, in preparation for the first silage cut in mid to late May.

In the still air of the morning and evening,

the winter-sown cereals will be sprayed for aphids and fertilised using satellite instructions as to where and what amounts are needed.

The early crops of oil seed rape are coming into blossom, with their eye-wateringly bright yellow colouring, highly nutritious pollen for the bees and a wonderful British home-produced oil for cooking and dressings.

Potato and root crops are prepared and sown; hoping that the soil temperature will be high enough for germination and growth. The dryer weather has allowed field work to be carried out without interruption, but some rain would be very welcome.

Our hedgerows are laden with blossom, pollen, cover for nesting birds and feed for butterflies and bees. During May, the bluebells, cow parsley, wild garlic and foxgloves take the place of the low-flowering plants such as primrose, aconites and violets.

Some of the rarer flowers can also be found now; wild orchids, cowslips and those delicate flowers we call milk maids!

Fruit producers will be hoping that the April frosts haven't affected the blossoms of the apples and pears trees for, as spring turns to summer, we look forward to the harvest of soft fruit and fresh vegetables.

It is now 6.30am, a bright sunny morning, the temperature is rising slowly and the swallows and house martins are swooping high – a sign of good weather and so our spring morning starts.

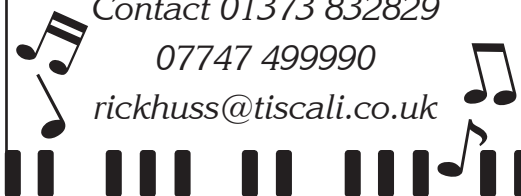
