New Highways Contractor

Wiltshire Council started working with a new local highways maintenance contractor on 1st April, as Milestone Infrastructure begins its $\pounds 80m$, five-year contract to help make the county's highways more resilient.

The Milestone Infrastructure team will help to keep Wiltshire moving by maintaining streetlights, cleaning and emptying gullies and drains, repairing potholes, gritting in winter, undertaking emergency maintenance and maintaining carriageways, footways, bridges and verges.

Milestone Infrastructure will also employ the council's Parish Stewards, who work closely with Wiltshire's town and parish councils to fix small highways issues in their communities.

Cllr Caroline Thomas, Cabinet Member

for Transport, said: "This new maintenance contract with Milestone Infrastructure represents a significant investment in our communities. It will help us to keep Wiltshire on the move, while also delivering on our key pledge to be a carbon neutral organisation by 2030.

"Highways maintenance is a key priority for us as a council, because we know how important it is for our residents and local businesses to travel safely and efficiently – be that walking, wheeling, cycling or driving – and we'll be working closely with Milestone Infrastructure over the coming years to improve the very successful Parish Steward scheme, and invest in social value initiatives that work with and enhance our communities."

Dorothy House is embarking on only its second international trek, this time heading to Vietnam in April 2024. The Hospice is looking for a group of intrepid adventurers looking for their next major challenge! With a project at a rural community hospital and a trek through the Pu Luong Natural Reserve, this is an opportunity to cross something incredible off the bucket list whilst also raising vital funds for Dorothy House.

Participants have to raise $\pounds 3,900$, with at least half going directly to Dorothy House Hospice to allow staff and volunteers to continue to deliver outstanding end of life care to patients and their families.

Leaving the UK on the 20th April you'll fly to Hanoi, spending some time there before heading out to Mai Chau to a community hospital. Once there, you'll take on a project within the palliative care unit of the hospital working alongside the local team to improve facilities.

The trek is graded moderate to challenging. You will be trekking for 5 consecutive days, over varying and sometimes challenging terrain. You will cover approximately 15-20km per day which will take around 6-7 hours. Those wanting to take part should get training, walking as much as possible, but it will be very achievable for anyone thinking about it.

What you need to know to cast your votes

I hope that everyone had time to enjoy the Easter break and wind down from the busy pace of life that most people lead. We are fortunate the wonderful countryside is never very far away from us here in West Wiltshire, and even if you must wrap up warm and put your wellies on, there are so many places accessible for us to enjoy. I certainly take the opportunity blow the cobwebs away walking on the hills whenever I can.

Moving from thoughts of a county walk to some practical things that may make people's lives a bit easier, I thought it would be a good idea to highlight how election processes are changing shortly.

There are no scheduled elections in our areas of Wiltshire in the foreseeable future that I am aware of, but the way we vote is changing from 4th May this year. This will affect elections for Wiltshire Council, Town and Parish Councils, Police and Crime Commissioner and UK Parliamentary and by-elections.

Photo ID will be required at all the above elections at a polling station. Only a small minority of people don't have any photo ID such a driving licence, passport, bus pass or some other specific forms of ID that are suitable, so this is unlikely to be an issue for very many people. However, to avoid any problems in the future one simple answer is to apply for a postal vote. Once you have a postal vote it will be continuous for relevant elections unless you cancel it.

I know that some people like the experience of going to the polling station and putting

their cross on their ballot paper in the booth, but this is not a problem as you can take your postal vote to a polling station, and it will be treated the same as a normal ballot paper.

The obvious benefit of a postal vote is that you have time to vote before the day of the election which can be very helpful if you are going to be away from home on election day, or for any other reason are unable to get to the polling station.

Applying for a postal vote is quite simple and can be done online at elections@wiltshire. gov.uk where you can download a postal vote application form, and return it either online at voting@wiltshire.gov.uk or post it to Election Services, at Wiltshire Council. Full details on the webpage*. You can also contact Election Services by email elections@wiltshire.gov.uk or by calling 0300 456 0122.

If you think a postal vote is a good idea for you, why not go ahead and apply for yours now, we never know what the future holds and you only need to apply once, but if you are a procrastinator, make sure your application is received at least 11 working days before the next election!

I wonder what comes into your mind when you think of May? I am instantly reminded of the Maypole and my unfortunate lack of coordination when attempting to dance around it. One of Shakespeare's sonnets also comes to mind in which he refers to 'The Darling buds of May', what a beautiful phrase.

May in the countryside is so lovely is it not; I feel very privileged to be able to live where I do and to be immersed in the natural world as spring unfolds and trees and verges take on a glorious green hue. Walking Betty yesterday I noticed the Hawthorn blossom unfurling; so delicate and pretty. I was reminded of the cyclical nature of life of which we humans are a part, the unfolding of the seasons, the cycle of the moon, the migration of the birds each year. The presence of Bird Flu has added a new yearly pattern to these things; today I let my chickens out into their proper run having been contained and covered for the winter months. It was lovely to watch their excitement at being able to roam freely in their large enclosure again.

We so often forget our place in this cycle of life and death do we not and get all upset and cross when joy fades or sorrow touches our lives. I think it is really helpful to acknowledge and embrace the rhythms of the year, it can be calming and reassuring to notice these things, and to begin to accept the turning of the seasons of love, joy, sorrow and pain that will come our way, and which are an integral part of what it means to be human. When we are in the throes of sorrow and pain, we can take comfort that like the seasons, this time will pass, and however hard it is to believe when our lives are dark and cold, spring will come again. Julian of Norwich expressed this beautifully when she wrote: 'All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well'.

The French theologian and philosopher Simone Weil talked about God as a great bell who sang creation. What a wonderful image; I imagine this deep bell vibrating throughout the created order, vibrating through our lives, holding our trials and tribulations in its deep, mysterious music.

Of course, it is all too easy to rush through life not really engaging with our surroundings, nor with our inner world for that matter, we are always thinking of the next thing. The journalist Tobias Jones wrote: 'It's a truism in modern life that we struggle to be settled or present. Because we can be anywhere, we actually end up being nowhere. We suffer as the sociologist Zygmunt Bauman once wrote, "electronic assured out-of-placeness." We are notoriously fidgety and lacking attention. We just keep clicking and tapping.'

Why don't we just stop, if only for a while? Why don't we peel ourselves away from the computer or from those things that clamour for our attention and sit still and listen. And then just for a moment, we might feel the presence of that great bell, whose voice resonates through all time and for eternity.

Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Councillor Phil Holihead rounds up the PC's meeting on 6th April

Planning

PL/2023/02117 Proposed 1.5 storey house in the grounds of 113 High Street. After considerable discussion about access the council chose not to object to the application, but to raise concerns about a further four vehicles using the narrow access lane. Additional concerns were raised regarding access during the build period and the council felt that this needed to be fully covered in a construction management plan.

A proposal to change the street signs at the junction between Cley Hill Gardens and Barters Drive was considered. Given that the new signs are confusing especially to delivery drivers in that the Barters Drive sign is outside a house in Cley Hill Gardens, it was agreed to forward a solution for updated signs to the Local Highways and Footpaths Group.

A brief update was given on the recently completed School Travel Plan and a meeting is being sought between the PC, the school, and Wiltshire Council to take forward for implementation some road safety improvements proposed in the plan.

The Community Infrastructure Levy funds remain untouched and plans are in hand to hold a public meeting (date to be confirmed), to bring forward projects for the PC to allocate funds. Other Section 106 funds from the Honey Glade development have mainly been allocated by Wiltshire Council to issues such as covering the cost of waste disposal in the development, improving footpaths and to Matravers School. Some funds have also been allocated to Chapmanslade for updating the Memorial Playing Field and a small group are working on what might be achieved with the available money.

The PC was concerned by the National Highways plans to close the slip road onto the A36 at Dead Maids junction for two months and has contacted National Highways to request that a traffic scheme be put in place to allow access for cars.

The May meeting is scheduled for 7pm on **Thursday 11th May** and will be the Annual Parish Meeting followed by a PC meeting.

Patricia Sharrocks rounds up the March meeting

THE MARKEN

Did you know that there are over 4000 miles of public footpaths in Wiltshire?

This was one of the interesting facts about the county which were shared with members of Corsley WI by Sarah Buttenshaw, our speaker in April. Sarah began with some geographical facts: Wiltshire is the second largest landlocked county in Britain, Shropshire being the largest. It is 52 miles from the northernmost point of the county to the southernmost, and 32 miles across at the widest point.

The evening provided an overview of the landscape, the history, the places and the features which make Wiltshire unique. The chalk downlands form a major part of the county and the sheep which grazed there supported the local wool industry and created wealth for wool merchants. The fertile river valleys provide good grazing for cattle, the dairy industry being important in Wiltshire too.

The flags of Wiltshire have green and white stripes which reflect the chalk uplands and the river valleys. The most recent flag features a great bustard, which the RSPB describes as an iconic species of the Wiltshire landscape. These birds were hunted to extinction in the nineteenth century but have been reintroduced on Salisbury Plain and are now breeding successfully.

The chalk downlands are famous for the white horses carved on hillsides across the county, the newest one being the Devizes white horse which was carved to mark the millennium. It is the only Wiltshire horse facing to the right! At Fovant, military cap badges were carved into the chalk during the second world war by troops stationed nearby. Legend has it that they got up early to do this and slid down the hill on tin trays to return to camp for breakfast!

Perhaps the most famous Wiltshire legend is the one Sarah told to explain why folk born in Wiltshire are known as moonrakers. One night some excise men hunting for smugglers caught a couple of locals raking a pond. When challenged, the men said they were raking for the 'gert cheese' and pointed to the reflection of the moon. The excise men were convinced and left laughing at the simple folk, who then raked out the contraband hidden in the pond!

Sarah talked about the Kennet and Avon canal which crosses the county linking the river Avon to the Thames via the Kennet and which is famous for the Caen Hill flight of locks at Devizes. She also described the county's rivers and the ancient forests of Selwood and Savernake. The woodlands between West Ashton and Yarnbrook, Picket Wood and Clanger Wood, are part of the old forest of Selwood.

The Wiltshire landscape is full of history, Sarah referred to Stonehenge, Avebury, Silbury Hill, iron age hill forts, the Battle of Ethendune when King Alfred fought the Danes, Old Sarum, the building of Salisbury Cathedral, the destruction of Devizes Castle and Wardour Castle in the Civil War. We heard about the historic buildings which have survived: Malmesbury Abbey, Edington Priory, Great Chalfield Manor, Longleat, Wilton House, Heale House and the village of Lacock.

It was an evening full of information and a reminder of the beautiful, fascinating county we live in with so much to explore and enjoy – perhaps by walking a few of those 4000 miles.

We look forward to our next meeting on 11th May in the Reading Room. Our speaker will be Nick King who will be talking about 'The Goats of The Gorge' grazing the cliffs at Cheddar. As always, visitors are welcome to join us.

Wonderful Walks

Alas, poor LADY, I knew you well...



I need to begin this month's walk with some very sad news. My little silver Honda Jazz (WN55 LDY) has gone; sudden bills for repairs and replacements proved too much for my purse to bear. If you've suffered the same trauma, you'll understand the

shock and the sorrow I feel; life is all about buses now; where they do go and don't, what days they do run and don't, too! For this month's walk, here's one I did a year ago. We're heading for Horningsham, though I haven't yet found a bus service going there. Is there one?! I parked up by the triangle of green across the road from the Bath Arms and headed left, along Water Lane, though you may have more trouble parking up in summer months. The road heads gently downhill, with cottages on your left and Horningsham's

flowing into Mill Farm's extensive pond on
your left. I'm assuming the 'pond' (it's more
like a lake!) was originally a mill pond, as in
collecting and regulating water flow for the
mill buildings that must once have been here.

Use the footbridge, pause and count the geese and ducks and then begin climbing uphill towards the left-hand bend. When you reach the cottage there, you'll see you've arrived in Church Street.

Across this street is the village War Memorial, high on the slope, above a water channel. Cross here and walk into the lane that passes the Memorial and dips again, passing

cottages and climbing once more to an almost-crossroads – the track ahead of you now (by 'The Corner) isn't a tarmacked road. If we've had no rain for a few days when you try this walk, give that track ahead a go. I can't remember where it ends, BUT you should be able to work out where you are from the views and, when you've had enough, what went up (you!), surely needs just to turn round and go back down, to get back to the crossroads?! As it had been wet for days when I did this walk, I gave

the track a miss and tried going left at the crossroads. This is a 'No Through Road' for traffic, but after half a mile or so, a gentleman working in a garden told me it leads to the wood you can see on the skyline; walk through that, he said, and you come out somewhere on the Shearwater road. I decided against it, simply

because I didn't want to walk three miles, be tired out and then have to work out how to call the police on my mobile phone for assistance; I'm not



sure they'd have been thrilled to hear from me, either! But if you try it, please write a report for the Bridge with photos, like I do, so that other people will have somewhere new to explore!



if you feel you've earned a rest with facilities and food! Before doing just that, I walked past and right, down into the barriered road leading to Longleat. Neither traffic nor walkers is allowed to enter Longleat this

Decision made on this occasion, I turned right at the crossroads,

into Chapel Lane. Along here, you'll pass a cemetery on the left and then, on the right, is the oldest non-conformist Chapel in England – well, bits of it are – built, I believe, by the Scottish Calvinist masons building Longleat House for Sir John Thynne. One of Whitbourne Chapel's preachers, Mr. Andrew Coxhead, leads Services at Horningsham Chapel, too. If the building's open, do pop in and have a look at it before walking on. Past the chapel is a long stone-built building with a postbox outside; this used to be Horningsham's Post Office, closed around the same time as the Corsley one, I think.

After that, you'll see a grassed area on both sides of the road and, in the distance, to your right, will be the Bath Arms, probably perfect way, unless they've paid the necessary fee, but I walked down to the arched



gatehouse and took a shot of Longleat House in the distance. That's your last car-based walk, unless I get offers of lifts; in future, walks will be where I can reach by bus, which will open up new areas for us, while closing down others. I also hope to take coach daytrips, extending opportunities for exploration; maybe we'll end up walking along a beach somewhere this summer..!

Does God 'speak' to believers today?

I was thinking of giving up running a Monday Club which I had run for many years in Brewham Baptist Chapel. At 4 pm the children on the school bus would alight outside the Chapel for the Club. After a biscuit and cold drink, we would sing choruses and have Bible quizzes and a Bible story.



Orcombe Point Prom, Exmouth, March 2023

I want to take you to Orcombe Point, Exmouth. The promenade was very wide with about a 6-7 foot drop to the sand. There is no raised wall so beach trappings are easily passed down to someone on the sand.

The car is parked at a slight angle to the kerb of the prom pointing to the west. The blankets are laid out for a day of sun bathing and paddling. There are four of us, mum, dad, daughter and youngest son. My daughter leaves the beach to renew the parking ticket.

What she sees as she gets up onto the prom will probably never leave her. She sees a car driven between our car and another two spaces away. It is at the wrong angle. The driver tries to select reverse to straighten the car and revs hard so that the car mounts the kerb onto the prom and stops. Further attempts to reverse sees the car hop across the prom, again and again.

People on the beach are shouting, but who takes any notice of noise on the beach?

The car eventually goes front wheels first over the edge of the prom and is only stopped from tipping over by people holding onto the back. An off-duty policeman carefully opens the driver door and turns the engine off and helps the driver out.

We only become aware of this when, looking up, we see the underside of the front of a car above us.

Well Lord you saved me from what might have been a disaster. I took it as a sign to continue the Club, which I did until the primary school children went to senior school and there was no one to get off the bus.

Countryside Matters

March winds and April showers Bring forth May flowers

Well we certainly have had April showers! April's rainfall (to 8th April) was 38mm. Our norm averages around 30mm for the entire month.

The month of May is a beautiful month, with birds singing, blossom in the hedges and orchards at their best and trees unfurling their wonderful leaf colouring.

The land is warm and ready for planting, so we celebrate with our Rogation Sunday, and traditional parish walks and blessing of the crops.

Hopefully the first crop of silage will be harvested this month and packed and rolled tightly into the silage clamps, ready preparing for next winter.

The spring-sown crops of cereal and maize are showing growth as the month progresses; the increased cost of fertiliser, diesel oil and wages being some of the concerns taken account into producing crops and, of course, the concerns of spraying crops for disease has to be considered with the effect the sprays will have on the food produced, on the atmosphere and the soil.

If the month of May is warm enough, the sheep will be shorn of their winter fleece; sadly the cost of shearing hardly covers the wool sold, but the welfare of the sheep is paramount. Shearing of the mother ewes causes some confusion for the young lambs, as the mother has lost some of its familiar smells, so for a few hours after shearing, there is much bleating of lambs as they search for their mothers and the milk they need. At this time of year, the woods, forests and hedgerows are full of colour and the perfume from our native bluebells, enjoy them for this month as the tree cover will soon darken the ground and the bluebells will disappear. Thankfully, the elegant foxgloves will follow on keeping the woodlands looking so beautiful.

Once again we look out for young nesting birds on the ground and in trees and hedges; do keep dogs on leads while out walking. Deer and hare are also hiding in grass so observing their temporary, safe hiding place is important.

For most, the coronation of King Charles III is the first coronation to be experienced – enjoy the event whether in town or countryside, it is part of our inheritance.

During the month of May, and it's Bank Holidays, there are many small and large country events for you to enjoy – village fayres, open gardens and local shows – they are there for everyone to see enjoy and understand what goes on in the countryside. *Judith Helliar*
