

Friends of Warminster Hospital Appeal

The Friends have launched an appeal to raise money for the purchase of an OCT (Optical Coherence Tomography) Eye Scanner which can help in the discovery and treatment of such eye problems as Glaucoma and Macular Degeneration.

The Friends have taken this step as there are a large number of people who have to travel to Salisbury or RUH Bath. Last year there were 597 people referred to Salisbury and a similar number to Bath. This involves a lot of time and travel, as there has to be monthly follow-up appointments.

Having this equipment in Warminster will not only help with travel, which can sometimes be difficult for those who are partially sighted, but will ease the load at the two hospitals.

The Friends will fund most of the cost (£36,000), but as this is such a large amount and will benefit the towns of Westbury and Trowbridge, the Chairman, Charles Lane, thought it only right that the appeal be widened to include them. Therefore he has written to appropriate organisations asking for support. The Friends have already purchased a Visual Field Analyser for the Ophthalmology Department in Warminster, and with the OCT scanner, the hospital would be well equipped to deal with weekly clinics.

Residents from the villages near to Warminster have always strongly supported the hospital in the past and any help that can be given to provide this equipment will be greatly appreciated.



Little Cuckoo's Pre-School **Textile Collection** Monday 15th October, 1pm

We are pleased to announce that the school has organised a textile collection with Bag2School in order to raise funds for Little Cuckoo's Pre-School.

Bag2School are the UK's leading textile recycler and fundraiser working with schools and since its inception in 2001 they have now paid out over £8 million.

As well as raising vitally needed funds for our school, it also helps the environment by helping to divert unwanted textiles away from landfill. A recent DEFRA report has shown that textile collection schemes are helping to reduce the volume of textiles discarded as municipal solid waste. However it is a fact that as a nation we still send 1,081,000 tonnes of textiles to landfill every year.

By getting involved in our Bag2School collection, you have an opportunity to sort through your cupboards and wardrobes and donate unwanted textiles in the bag provided – this can include adults' and children's clothes, shoes (tied together please), hats, belts, bags, soft toys, curtains and bedding (not duvets or pillows). We will receive £500 per tonne or £0.50/kg which will be a great boost for our fundraising. In addition it will also raise awareness amongst the children of the benefits of recycling and reuse.

If you find you've filled the donation bag and still have more, you can use any other bag to donate your items: don't forget to ask grandparents, friends and neighbours to have a sort out as well!

2012 Poppy Appeal

The Rector writes

September marked the beginning of the new school year. I enjoy seeing the new arrivals in our primary schools. As rising fives, some are in fact only just four years old if they are summer born. They seem so little; yet, even at four, most of them have a confidence about life which is surprising. Many of them are used to electronic gadgetry and can use a computer mouse or touch screen, and, they are definite about what they like and dislike. When asked what she enjoyed about the first week at school, my grand-daughter replied 'going to assembly'. So much for the classroom activities, teaching and learning!

As well as new children, our schools welcome new staff to their respective teams. We have new Head Teachers at Heytesbury and Chapmanslade and we look forward to getting to know them, and new members of staff, as the school year unfolds. A Steiner school has opened in Corsley where it will have a temporary home until its permanent building in Frome is ready in eighteen months time. 

Countryside Matters

The cereal harvest is just finished, and no sooner have those golden crops been harvested than the earth is ready to be ploughed and re-seeded.

In between these two processes the hedge trimmers will go into the fields to reduce the level of this year's growth: this will encourage growth in the bottom of the hedge to give wildlife some ground cover. The hedge becomes denser, making it more stock-proof. If it a hedge gets too tall, it will reduce the daylight reaching the crop in the field, leading to poorer germination of the seed and slower overall growth.

Some fields will be left with stubble through the winter, allowing the birds and other wildlife to feed. Stubble also stops rain and wind from eroding the soil.

During the next month or two clouds of Starlings will gather, especially towards dusk. Although this is not always welcomed by farmers because of the damage the birds can cause, the flocks are still a magnificent sight. The biggest flocks are seen out on the Somerset Levels – well worth a visit.

Other birds such as Fieldfares and Redwings will be coming here to spend their winter with us. Numbers of Blackbirds, Song Thrushes and many other resident species increase as they are joined by flocks from Scandinavia as winter spreads from the North.

The maize and potato crops will be harvested this month: weather permitting. The maize has been the poorest for many years, with most crops growing to only ½ or 1/3 of its usual height. The next few weeks will show whether the cobs will have formed and ripened to make that essential winter feed for the cattle. If not, then feed will have to be bought in for the herds. The warm ground temperatures, combined with the damp weather encourage the growth of all fungi. Field mushrooms make a tasty meal, but care must be taken when foraging for mushrooms as some are poisonous.



Here in the countryside we celebrate our harvest time with Harvest Suppers and church services of thanksgiving. This is all part of keeping alive our traditional celebrations of living in the countryside. I hope you enjoy your local celebrations.

From the potting shed

Jobs for this month

- Clear up fallen autumn leaves regularly
- Cut back perennials that have died down
- Divide herbaceous perennials and rhubarb crowns
- Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into the greenhouse
- Plant out Spring cabbages
- Harvest apples, pears, grapes and nuts
- Prune climbing roses
- Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedges in mild areas
- Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf

In detail...

Leaves will begin to fall and should be collected to make compost.

Clean down and disinfect your greenhouse, standing the plants outside. Clean the outside of the roof in particular with a long, soft brush, to maximise the winter light levels inside.

Dry off baskets and pots of tuberous begonias under cover until the stalks fall away. Store the tubers as they are, or dry and cleaned of soil.

Loganberries and raspberries should be planted and established plants should have the wood that has borne fruit removed to ground level.

You may still get a crop of radishes and lettuces if you sow now before the weather breaks.

Once blackened by frost, dahlias can be lifted, dried off and stored in a cool, dark, airy, frost-free place. Storing them in dry sand stops them shrivelling. Tough varieties can be left in the ground and mulched. As light levels fall on window sills, keep houseplants rather drier, to slow down growth during the winter. Some perennials poke through very early in the Spring, and if you need to divide them, now is not a bad time.

Anemone beds should be got ready and the tubers planted.

Any root vegetables, such as carrots and beetroot, should be lifted when their tops fade – only store those in good condition. Onions and turnip beds should be thinned. Seed gatherers should collect aster, hollyhock and dahlia seeds.

It's a good time to plant all evergreens, but make sure that you keep them watered for a couple of months, especially in windy weather, until they can put out new roots. Remember to close down the greenhouse at night, but open it wide in the morning to prevent soaring temperatures and disease. Gladioli corms should be lifted and stored for next year.

What is so flamboyant at this time of year as a clump of nerine bulbs, like small, lipstickpink agapanthus? Divide them now after flowering, putting them in hot, sunny, dry soil, with the snout of the bulb just under the surface.

Herbaceous plants may be increased by division and then replanted and the new plants moved to new positions.

Making new borders next year on clay soil? Dig them over roughly now, adding old compost as you go.

Sweet peas seeds should be sown.

Plants under glass need protection at night as the frosts begin to bite. Make sure that the plants you put in the greenhouse are free from disease.

While the weather is kind, finish clipping evergreen hedges and topiary. Using secateurs, shorten back to their base any shoots that are starting to run up the hedge. Now is the time to pot up hardy and half hardy plants for displays.

Pumpkin Pie

Ingredients

300g shortcrust pastry (plus a little plain flour for rolling out) 250g pumpkin purée 1tsp ground cinnamon ½tsp ground ginger ½tsp ground nutmeg 100g light brown soft sugar 2tbsp maple syrup 2 large eggs 150ml pot single cream Roasted pumpkin seeds (optional decoration)

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C (fan oven 160°C) or gas mark 4. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and line a 20cm tin. Prick the base, line with greaseproof paper and weigh it down with baking beans or rice. Bake for 10 minutes.

Remove paper and beans, return the pastry base to the oven for 5 minutes, then remove and set aside.

Mix the pumpkin purée with the cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, sugar and maple syrup.

Whisk the eggs and cream together in a large bowl until evenly mixed. Whisk in the pumpkin purée mixture and pour into the pastry case.

Bake the pumpkin pie for 30 minutes or until just set in the centre. Cool and decorate with pumpkin seeds.




