Safeguarding and enhancing our natural environment

What is it and how can it help us?

Chapmanslade is working on a new village plan. The initial consultation showed that the topic of "safeguarding and enhancing our natural environment" was a significant consideration for many villagers, and I was asked to write about this and what science can offer.

Environmental research in the UK is largely funded by the Natural Environment Research Council (NERC) and some by the Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council (BBSRC). When I worked at BBSRC, I used to joke with NERC staff that there was no such thing as the natural environment in the UK, apart from beaches between the low and high water mark. Due to centuries of urban development, agriculture and industry, everything else is a managed environment, and so it should be managed as best we can to safeguard and enhance it.

So, what do scientists contribute to this and how can we help them? Ecologists look at the relationships between animals, plants and the environment and need data on local conditions and how they vary with time to perform their studies. Plant biologists may be interested in crop and tree diseases and need reports of crops or trees showing signs of disease or invasion of alien plants. Geologists will be interested in the



landscape and how heavy rain or snow may affect rivers, and they need access to land to measure river flow, for example. Agricultural scientists will be interested in the crops that are grown and the interplay of land, crops, animals and pests.

However, many of us are not scientists or significant landowners. So, what can we all do? As a gardener, you can do this by managing your lawns, hedges, flower beds, vegetable plots and fruit trees. These can give both visual pleasure and food, and can help protect insect and bird life. As a walker, you can do this by not damaging fences, not dropping litter, and ensuring that your dog's faeces are collected and taken away, thus safeguarding the visual amenity that the environment provides.

We can provide the simple numbers that are essential for the scientists. How many trees

are there? What variety of plants are found? What types of soil are there and where? Where and when are animal tracks found? Are there areas where waste accumulates through natural processes (e.g. wind and streams)? Has waste been dumped? Have any public footpaths or bridleways been blocked? There are sometimes "citizen science" projects to collect such information for use by naturalists and other specialists.

We can also be proactive. We can report blocked public ways to the Parish Council. We can seek to control (or persuade others to control) harmful weeds, such as Japanese Knotweed or Himalayan Balsam. We can report signs of animal invasion of fields or forests to landowners. We can report diseased trees to the Forestry Commission.

Enhancing the natural environment is a step beyond safeguarding what is already there. Examples include developing communal space or creating community gardens. However, not everyone will approve of changing the existing environment, and such developments need public discussion. Nevertheless, we each can enhance our environment by keeping the appearance of our homes, gardens and workplaces neat and tidy, which will make our living and working environments more pleasant.

The House of Lords is currently examining the effectiveness of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 which helps protect the natural environment and biodiversity while promoting the needs of rural communities. Their conclusions will be of importance to us all.



Corsley Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

The Parish Council (PC) met once in September for an occasional meeting, but one with a fairly full agenda, including traffic safety issues raised by residents living in the vicinity of Corsley Heath, three planning applications, an update on progress with superfast broadband installation in Corsley, and other regular items. For the items on road safety and the broadband update, eighteen residents and Fleur de Rhe Philipe, our County Councillor, were present.

Corsley Road Safety Issues

The Parish Council had been approached by Mrs Gill Sheppard who reported increasing concerns over the speed and volume of traffic using the A362 through the Village, from those living in and around Corslev Heath. These concerns centred on the dangers regularly faced by residents when making the crossing of the A362 at the Heath and the risks were particularly felt by parents whose children need to use the buses to get to and from school, or the War Memorial Playing Field, and by elderly residents in the face of vehicles travelling at or around the 40mph speed limit. The latter, coupled with the limitations on visibility and the "triangle" layout give very little time for a safe crossing of the road or for vehicles to join the A362 safely from either side of the road. Mrs Sheppard had written to all the residents of Birchwood Close, Heathway and Whitbourne Moor and, as a result, the PC had received a further ten written representations about the traffic issues.

Mrs Sheppard addressed the meeting and all those residents who attended were given the opportunity to make their own points. There was wide ranging discussion based on responses to Mrs Sheppard's letter covering:

- Pedestrian safety children and the elderly at significant risk
- Speeding the 40mph appropriate is inadequate and routinely ignored
- Excessive heavy traffic general increase in numbers and heavy vehicles breaking westbound weight limitation
- Difficult junctions at Corsley Heath obstructed visibility and acute angles

Simon Jasper gave a detailed resumé of the PC's long-standing and ongoing dialogue with Wiltshire, answered questions and statements from residents and explained the current position on the two main issues, speeding and HGV traffic. In summary:

- The speed limit will not be reduced to 30mph in Corsley Heath under current national guidelines. Wiltshire is constrained to follow these guidelines and the last national audit of speed limits in 2009 stands., A speed check in Corsley in 2014 indicated average speeds were within limits, which precluded the village from the speed watch programme at that time.
- Introduction of an 18 tonne limit for eastward travelling HGVs awaits work on the A350/A303 junction, which is currently regarded as unsafe for heavy HGV traffic. This would be the route taken

by HGV traffic if the weight limit were to be imposed. (The relevant documents and summaries of emails are on the village website under A362 Road Safety or www.corsleyandthebridge.co.uk. Fleur de Rhe Philipe amplified the background to this issue and explained that there are three Villages affected by the problem, Chapmanslade, Corsley and Maiden Bradley. Application of a weight limit in any one of these would exacerbate problems in the other two, both of which are equally concerned about their own road safety and HGV traffic.

The PC is entirely sympathetic to the issues raised, which add to those already part of the ongoing dialogue with Wiltshire, including the Lane End and Sturford junctions, and agreed to follow three lines of development:

- To support a Lorry Watch under Gill Sheppard's leadership with the aim of reducing HGVs over 18 tonne illegally travelling in a westerly direction on the A362. Initially this will be a Pilot Scheme seeking to qualify for official Wiltshire Council Lorry Watch status. It will commence in early October.
- To apply for a "metro test" (speed test) on the A362 to update the one carried out in 2014 with the aim of qualifying for community speed-watch.
- To request a review of road safety in Corsley Heath by the Wiltshire Council Traffic Officer with emphasis on pedestrian safety and the exit by White Horse Motors onto the A362. Out of this informal visit the Parish Council will seek to gain authority for any work through the Area Board and the Community Area Transport Group.
- · Consideration to be given to including an uplift in next year's Precept to cover the Parish's 25% contribution to any work.

The Parish Council would like to thank Mrs. Sheppard and the residents of the Corsley Heath area for re-energising these issues and producing the volunteer capacity to do something about illegal HGV traffic.

Broadband

Hugh Deed, Chairman of Corsley Broadband Ltd (CBBL), gave the meeting an update on the status of the superfast broadband roll-out in Corsley. CBBL is the Company formed to contract with BT Openreach to deliver the additional Village funded capability required to give the whole Village access to superfast, to which he PC contributed from the precept. Essentially the latter is the new box at St Margaret's Church.

The details can be found on the Corsley broadband web site (hdwebsites, wixsite. com\broadband) and Hugh summarised the position:

- In general, BT Openreach commitments now mean that nearly all residents can, or will by year end 2018, be able to get access to better broadband service; in most cases this means at least 24Mbps and in most cases far higher up to 80Mbps in some (very lucky) cases.
- The new (additional) cabinet at St Margaret's church has now been installed. It has yet to be commissioned. This is the cabinet which was paid for by the contributions from Longleat, Elizabethan Evening and Corsley Parish Council. Not long to wait now for the residents who can be served by that box to be able to order higher speeds if they want. This site will be updated when orders can be placed.
- Anomalies in the advertised availability of superfast broadband in specific locations, eg Roddenbury View and Birchwood Close believed to be errors on BT's part and do not reflect the reality of the infrastructure.

• Power to the long waited box at Deep Lane/ A362 should be laid by September with cabinet installation and commissioning following swiftly after. Provisional indications are that customer orders from those to be served by this box may be able to be taken by end September/early October. Red Cottages should benefit from this installation.

New Planning Applications

17/07555/LBC - Court Farm, Court Lane Conversion of outbuilding to workshop, and erection of double garage with studio over

Court Farm is a grade 2 listed building and this application covers both listed building and full planning consent. The listing relates to the house and the proposed changes have no direct affect on the house and its listing features. The external appearance of the workshop will be unchanged by the changes; the new garage will be visible alongside the house, but is set back from its line. Its style is not considered to detract from the setting of the property or the immediate vicinity.

No comments had been received from any other parties and the PC resolved to record no objection.

17/07846/FUL - Deerleap Cottage 112 The Hollow Corsley BA12 7PD

Change of use of agricultural land to domestic curtilage, addition of access drive

This application raised considerable discussion. The application comprises four plans, difficult to read in electronic copy, the latter now being the only format offered to Parish Councils, and there is no supporting case for the proposed change.

The PC had two major concerns over this planning application. First, the lack of documentation accompanying the application to provide any justification for the proposed change of use and, second, the size of the area proposed for change of use effectively doubles the domestic curtilage, with associated potential for further development applications for the area proposed.

However, the Parish Council resolved to have no objection to this application provided that it were possible to make it subject to a condition that the land within the proposed extension of domestic curtilage was not allowed any permitted development rights.

The PC received one strong objection to the application, by E mail, but too late for consideration at the meeting.

17/06979/FUL - 25 Birchwood Close

New detached workshop

This application was made on the basis that the existing garage at No. 25 was soon to be converted to living accommodation for an elderly family member and a new space was therefore required for equipment currently stored in the garage. The proposed new workshop is placed on the rear boundary of the property.

No comments had been received from any other parties and the PC resolved to record no objection.

Previous Planning Applications

17/06496/FUL - 36 Temple, Corsley

Erection of timber summerhouse This is an application replace two existing garden old sheds by an attractive wooden summerhouse on the same site.

This had been approved by Wiltshire with standard conditions, plus a requirement that the old sheds be demolished.

17/03946/FUL - 83a Lane End

Erection of boundary fence panel, designed to mimic the appearance of a hedgerow In the last Bridge brief, Wiltshire's approval

of this application was reported, as was the PC's strong objection to the decision. A reply has been received from Wiltshire, on behalf of Mike Wilmott, Head of Development Management, which will be placed on the Bridge web site.

His major conclusion was:

".....Whilst I accept that parish councils may have a good understanding of local conditions, the local planning authority when assessing any planning application must take account of the expert advice provided in the technical guidance and over-arching national policy. In this case, the technical advice was carefully applied; and, I have set this out below.....

....Given the above technical confirmation I am satisfied that the application was subject to a thorough, full and informed analysis. In these circumstances, the Council's decision was properly arrived at, and whilst I appreciate that the parish council is disappointed at the outcome, the decision will not be reviewed. "

This is a very disappointing response, but one which the PC now has to accept. However, the PC will now do its utmost to ensure that the visibility at this junction is as good as it can be, within the limitations imposed by Wiltshire's decision, and will be examining the potential for adjustments to the hedge to the east of the boundary of 83a.



Seven Open Doors

Dear Friends,

Walking the dogs this afternoon I found that my normal route was unavailable as the gate onto the footpath was closed. So necessity dictated that I walked along the road, which is always a bit perilous because although it is a little country lane basically, it has lots of twists and turns and cars travel along it at alarming speed. But actually, I really enjoyed my walk and was struck by how much we miss when we drive around in our cars, probably preoccupied with thoughts about the next thing we have to do, or in my case, what I'm going to say in the sermon and what on earth we are going to have for dinner!

Travelling at speed through the country lanes at this time of year we remain blissfully unaware of the extraordinary bounty the earth offers us. I drive along said road several times a week and I hadn't noticed the lovely red hips and hawes, the gorgeous glossy acorns nor the plethora of juicy purple blackberries that stained my fingers as I pulled them off the branches. I'm afraid my walk took longer than necessary because I kept stopping to eat them; no chance of them making it into a blackberry and apple pie!

If you think about it, the seasons are ordered in a really clever way. Nature gives us calorific sustenance in the form of fruit and nuts that are energy dense to keep us warm in the winter months; we need those calories when the cold and wet come. Of course we have lost our sense of reliance on this natural harvest because we can trip down to the supermarket and buy whatever we want whenever we want. But for our forbearers these berries, fruits and nuts would have been carefully harvested and stored and would have been vitally important for their survival. Our disconnect with the earth has had and continues to have appalling consequences for the well being of the created order in the widest sense. We have seen evidence of this in the terrible hurricanes that have battered parts of the world recently, they didn't come from nowhere; their severity is a result of global warming.

Reading around this theme I came across a concept called 'reverential ecology' which really spoke to me and chimed with the Christian calling to care for God's earth and all living things.

'Reverential Ecology adds an extra dimension of profound feelings of reverence towards all life. Reverential Ecology operates upon the principle that all natural things are holy, possessing the divine, not as a transcendent presence but rather as an immanent one. In place of controlling, owning or possessing, mankind participates in the process of the intricately woven web of life, acting no longer as masters or stewards of the earth; rather as participants and co-creators of the earth.'

Now I am going to hold my hands up here and admit that the Christian church does not have a good track record in this area. We have taken God's injunction in the book of Genesis to care for the earth as permission to dominate and exploit it purely for our own ends with total disregard for the impact of our actions on the natural world. We need to rediscover what it means to live in harmony with mother nature and what it means to live with reverence for all created things, for after all, as the psalmist so beautifully put it 'The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it.

It is tucked back from the road and can be easily missed. Under the provisions of her will, the late Mary Barton of Corsley House left a sum of money in trust to build a small church at Temple "... to serve that part of the parish..." in memory of her late husband and son.

St Mary's was dedicated by the Bishop of Salisbury on 30th July 1903. St Mary's is a particularly beautiful small church and has been described as a real gem of the arts and crafts era in late Perpendicular style. It really is an extraordinary place and has many attractive decorative features and fine altar frontals.

Although it is most certainly a church and, as such, generations of villagers have worshipped in it, unlike most church buildings and grounds which are owned by the church, St Mary's is the responsibility of the Barton Will TruSt Services are conducted as mutually agreed between the Trustees, PCC and incumbent of the Parish. We still hold regular services at St Mary's. Normally one Matins service and one Communion service are held each month using the 1662 prayer book.

Sadly, congregation numbers have been falling to a worrying low level. This is largely due to age and infirmity, and people moving away from the parish, although at Christmas and Easter there is still a good-sized congregation.

St Mary's was, and is, a much loved building and we want to make sure we look after it in the best way we can. Following meetings between the Trustees, the Priest in Charge and the Churchwardens, it was agreed to proceed with a full consultation process to consider the future of St Mary's. It is hoped a way forward can be found to keep the church viable in one form or another, but it is accepted there are difficulties, particularly the lack of car parking and the steep access via steps.

Everyone in the parish and any person interested in St Mary's are invited to attend a consultation meeting in the church at 7pm on Wednesday, 18th October.

In the meantime, the Trustees would be pleased to hear from anyone who would be willing to be considered as a Trustee of the Barton Will Trust and is able to give the necessary commitment to care for this unique building. It is the prerogative of the existing Trustees to appoint succeeding Trustees. Three of the four current Trustees are well into their eighties and all four are anxious to hand over the reins.

Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Notes from the Parish Council meeting held on 31st August and events since the meeting

Weight restriction

We shall continue to pressure both Wiltshire Council and Highways England regarding the ineffective signage at the slip road on the A36. There appears to be a serious difference between Highways England and Wiltshire Council over the costs of the changes proposed by Highways England. The Parish Council has again written to both parties expressing our concern that this is now a safety issue emanating from the sub-standard signage. We have asked Fleur de Rhe Phillipe to raise this matter in the appropriate department at Wiltshire Council.

Village Plan

It was reported to the meeting that the team working on the questionnaire had processed 356 questionnaires. A short report of the results was given to the meeting. It was agreed that an open meeting would be held in mid-November (since confirmed as 16th November at the Village Hall) when the village would be given a full report back. The team on the Village Plan were thanked for all their hard work in analysing the questionnaires.

New housing proposal

There was a very full discussion of the proposals from Wiltshire Council over the allocation of land for future housing developments. The discussion was able to view the results of the village questionnaire and it was clear that even though there was a significant number who were undecided the view was very much in favour of smaller developments in the village. It was clear that the village was very much in favour of affordable housing, be it shared ownership or rented, but the issue is that such provision will only come if the overall number of new houses is sufficiently large for the development to have such a provision. The conclusion of the discussion was that for the period in question that the parish Council felt that current and future infill/ windfall developments would be sufficient. It was resolved that the Parish Council would respond to the consultation and oppose the proposals as shown in the Wiltshire Council consultation paper.

It was also resolved to oppose the change in the settlement boundary and that the Village Hall and the amenity area should remain outside the settlement boundary as now.

Planning Applications and Issues

There were are two applications to be considered at the meeting.

The first is a single-storey extension to 10 Clevhill Gardens – planning application 17/04325/FUL.

The second is a revision to the previously approved application to build a car-port

at 53 High Street – planning application 17/07384/FUL. The revision is to include a study in the roof-space of the car port.

There were no objections to either proposal.

Since the meeting there has been another event at Thoulstone Park. Although we recognise that ThouIstone Park has permission for six events per year this last one has given rise to several complaints about noise. The Chairman has arranged to meet the Events Manager in the near future to discuss the issues.

The Parish Council did enquire of the status of the rebuilt shed situated alongside the bridleway just down from the High Street. The Parish Council has been advised that planning permission will be required for the structure and no doubt such an application will be discussed at a future meeting.

Speeding

The Parish Council is very aware that traffic issues are a matter of great concern in the village and certainly features prominently in the questionnaire. The challenge will be finding solutions! I have to report that we were unsuccessful with our application to purchase two speed indicating devices for the village.

Highways

The Chairman reported that the problem with getting the road gullies emptied is ongoing.

Footpaths

John Foster reported that there was a serious problem with the flooding of the bridleway due to water emanating from an adjoining property. John Foster to report the issue to Wiltshire Council (since done).

It has now been 5 years since the Playing Field Committee worked so hard to win the Lottery grant that transformed the playing field from an unused field with a rusty football goal and a few bits of old play equipment into the amazing free facility that is now the envy of local villages and towns.

Our Annual General Meeting will be held at the Cross Keys on 9 November at 19.30hrs. Do come and meet us.

As the summer draws to a close it has been another very successful year for the playing field. Fun in the Sun, funded by Wiltshire Council, had its most successful year with 25 children attending on each of four weeks to enjoy free multi-sports coaching provided by Bath Rugby and Wiltshire Cricket. They even managed to continue on the veranda when it rained!

The cricket club has also managed to play every match, except where the opposition did not turn up, despite some difficult weather conditions. This is a testament to Ped's brilliant work as groundsman with Simon's support and by the excellent choice of the original founders in choosing a spot at the top of a hill on greensand with wonderful drainage. They will be completely refurbishing the cricket square over the winter so expect it to play even better next year.

Badgers were a great problem in the spring, scraping the turf away over huge areas of the field and leaving their mess everywhere. After considerable research, doing a risk assessment and seeking approval from our insurers, it has been agreed that specialist electric fencing will be installed around the boundaries of part of the field to deter the badgers. It will not harm the creatures or affect users and will only be turned on during the hours of dusk till dawn, when the field should be devoid of users.

There have also been lots of bookings for children's parties and what better venue could you think of for lots of children with cake and fizzy drink? Plenty of space to run around, for organised games or a bouncy castle. You don't want then charaing about vour house!

The playing field has also been hired for a local company's annual staff barbecue and for local groups to play croquet, amongst other things.

It is worth noting that we do not just hire out the pavilion. You can also hire the marquee, pop-up gazebo and barbecue if you have a function at home. We have a portable PA unit for the playing of music and can arrange a license if alcohol is to be served at an event in the field. Table tennis is always available at the field and we leave a couple of bats and balls out at all times for you to enjoy. We have also allow our mower and long grass cutter to be used on the old school field and scarifier to deal with moss in lawns. Parking is available at the field, but we do not permit dogs anywhere on the field apart from the car park.

To close out the year we have our annual apple pressing day on the 8th October. This year we will be using our new electric apple mill (thank you to SA Group for supporting the purchase). It is a monster machine capable of reducing the time taken to process a bucket of apples to pulp for pressing from about half an hour to five seconds. The equipment is also available for hire for those unable to attend on 8 October who are keen to make their own cider.

Finally, we have not scheduled a Halloween event this year. Whilst they are very popular with the children and parents they are a lot of work to organise for the very small team that run the playing field. However, if any parents are keen to hold an Halloween event and want to organise it, we will be happy to support them. We have a box of halloween kit that could be used.

Village Plan update

Adam Oakley reports some of the findings of the recent questionnaire

There was a fantastic response to the questionnaire with a total of 357 being completed and a response from an estimated 68% of homes in the village. Thank you to everyone who completed a questionnaire and thank you to all who have worked over the summer recording all of the data and comments.

Presentation of results

We are making a presentation of the results at the Village Hall on November 16th at 7.30pm which will follow an earlier than normal Parish Council Meeting. There are a huge number of statistics to absorb so we plan to make the evening interesting with short presentations followed by a question session where we can discuss the way forward for each topic. Everyone is welcome and there will be a second presentation on Sunday 19th November at 2.30pm to make sure everyone gets an opportunity.

We are still recording all of the comments that were made on the questionnaire and realise that many residents are passionate about different subjects. We have all of this data being built into a database that will hopefully provide answers to all sorts of auestions. Over the coming months we can discuss this data and the comments and hopefully develop some projects and activities. We need people to get involved in the things that matter in our community. Already action has begun to take shape on a number of topics including improvements to the playground, environment enhancement and our roads and traffic. Much more can be done and there is opportunity for everyone to get involved.

Below are just a few of the results

- A huge 86% agree that traffic congestion at drop-off and pick-up times at the school is a cause for concern. 58% strongly agree and just 2% disagree.
- 66% of respondents believe that pedestrian safety requires review regarding pavements
- Only 1% disagree that more social events could include the elderly and vulnerable in our community but 49% agree or strongly agree.
- 70% want more eco-friendly dog waste bins and 65% want more litter bins
- 38% would like to see green space used for a car park while 18% disagree
- 61% would like to see any homes built affordable to buy.

A wild boar and a bull

As Pope Leo sat down to relax after an exciting wild boar hunt a messenger arrived with a draft of a 'bull' - not the bovine species, but a document that the pope had to authorise. The bull began, 'Arise, O Lord, a wild boar has entered your vineyard...' and condemned a German monk, Martin Luther, calling on him to recant of his writings.

For some years Luther had been a thorn in the side of the medieval Church because he wanted to reform things, especially after he nailed a notice on the Castle Church door in Wittenberg on 31 October 1517 – 500 years ago this October. The notice set out 95 points Dr Luther wanted to discuss and is widely regarded as the start of the Reformation that spread like a wildfire around Europe, including England.

Luther's views arose from the struggle that he had gone through to find salvation. He had thought he must do all he could to make himself righteous. Eventually, Luther understood that God in His love and arace had provided a Saviour in Jesus Christ who died for our sins and by trusting in Him we receive the gift of Christ's righteousness. Romans 1:17 became his theme: 'the righteous shall live by faith'.

Luther appeared before the Diet of Worms in 1521 where he boldly said: '... my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand, may God help me'.

The 'wild boar' could not be contained and after being imprisoned by 'friends' for a while, he returned to Wittenberg to carry on his reforms. He married an ex-nun -Katherine von Bora – who was a great help to him. The 'bull' was consigned to the dustbin of history.





Tales from the passenger seat

Last month I drew readers attention to the new legislation that has been gareed concerning learner drivers being allowed on motorways [albeit only with a qualified instructor in a dual controlled car]. This is a purely voluntary arrangement and will not form part of any new driving test requirements. I suffer misgivings on this proposal, since a less experienced driver on motorways is not, in my view, a good thing. The government thinking is to give people motorway experience [if they so choose] before they pass the test, so that once they have passed, they are not loose on the motorway without having already had a go.

This seems a good idea in principle, except it ignores the fact that instructors already offer motorway lessons to pupils for when they have passed the test. There is also a scheme, called Pass Plus, which not only includes post test motorway experience and other aspects of driving, but also runs in conjunction with a number of insurance companies, who offer discounts on new driver insurance if they have taken a Pass Plus course with a registered Pass Plus instructor. Such instructors [I am one], carry certified documents that are accepted by the industry which prove a person has undertaken such a course.

Therefore if properly planned, motorway experience could be obtained ahead of a new driver going on a motorway for the first time unaccompanied, but the pupil would be that much safer on the motorway, having already passed their test.

The exact date for this new legislation, due to commence in 2018 will be announced in due course

The other day I was asked by a parent on the merits of them taking their offspring to practice in the family car. Private practice is generally considered to be a good thing, but it is not essential. Certainly it allows a pupil to practice lots of the manoeuvres, and to get better physical control over a car, ie build up muscle memory. And if a pupil finds learning generally hard, then extra practice is most definitely of immense benefit, and this can help in reducing the total amount of lessons needed.

If, however, a pupil is naturally gifted at driving, very coordinated and good at reading the road, then such extra practice, whilst beneficial, will not result in a mass reduction in lessons required since such a pupil isn't going to need a lot of lessons anyway.

The best time to get maximum benefit from parental input, is to go out with a parent after the pupil has had a few professional lessons, been taught hillstarts and has covered all the manouvres. They are not only safer, but able to have a go at practicing what they have been taught. Going out with a parent when the pupil is virtually ready for the test is all a bit late and although obviously a bit helpful, does not succeed in making best use of parental time, since at that stage, the pupil is being taught the final touches, rather than the basic car control skills.

But it is not the wisest decision to go out before having had lessons if the pupil cannot do hillstarts... we don't live in Holland I

Countryside Matters


Whilst the usual author of Countryside Matters is admiring the crops of maize and sunflowers over the waters in France (but will be back by the time this is published) I write from the slightly wetter and more challenging climate of Corsley!

August, September and October are always a nervous time for all farmers. The run up to harvest is always worrying having spent such a long time cultivating the land, planting the crops and nurturing and watching them grow. To bring them in at exactly the right time can be very challenging. Heavy rain, strong winds and morning frosts, all of which we've been having recently, can damage a long growing season. So, a considerable amount of time is spent watching the weather forecasts for a clear few dry days, examining crops to catch their optimum ripening and on the phone to contractors to ensure the large and expensive harvesting machinery and its drivers are free. All a very fine balancing act but essential for us to feed stock and others to sell crops.

Those growing wheat, barley, oil seed rape, etc have largely finished harvesting. We have had some luck already with some feed being bought in including a large number of round bales of hayledge (dry grass silage), some of which you may notice have been wrapped in pink bale wrap this year to support breast cancer awareness. These have already been placed in fields planted with kale which will be grazed by cows over the winter. We, and others, just have crops such as maize,

potatoes, fodder and sugar beet etc left in the ground as I write.

It's also a very lovely time of the year on our farm for welcoming new life to the world. Our herd of cows is split into a spring and autumn calving group.



Our 350 lovely autumn calving heifers and cows will produce about 350 calves (it's quite simple maths!) most of which will be born under close supervision in the calving paddock in front of the main farmhouse, so that we can be on hand 24/7 to deal with any issues that may arise. We have a rate of about 10 calves a day at peak times, which keeps us all busy.
